ROBERT POWERS gave an all-day workshop on January 29th, entitled "Uptight about Equality". It was excellent. The workshop committee did an excellent job of setting up a smooth operation and Bob Powers took over from there. We had many interested laymen at this workshop as well as professionals.

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WINTER QUARTER HALF OVER. The winter quarter for the Alfred Adler Institute is half over with very satisfactory classes both from content and number of students. The spring quarter brochure will be ready for mailing by February 21st.

DR. ROLLAND RICE has been teaching classes in the Minneapolis area, but this quarter has started classes at Winona and Lake City, MN., teaching two classes entitled "Encouraging Children to Learn" and Basic Principles of Adlerian Psychology". He was also requested to write weekly columns about relationships and problems with children from the Red Wing, MN. newspaper.

BOB AND JEAN WILLHITE had a short work-shop at Waseca, MN. for those interested in the community to start a FEC. This group has been exposed to many programs and now feels that this community is ready to start its own activities.

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disgruntled. They report excellent progress and some very interesting experiences, so much so that they are being urged to write about their experiences for publication.

A NEW FEC WILL OPEN on February 22nd, called Lake Family Education Center and will be located in Excelsior, MN. Mrs. Emily Geckler, will be Director. Many people deserve congratulations for getting this center started.

NEW SECRETARY FOR ALFRED ADLER INSTITUTE Mrs. Muriel Glaim is the new Executive Secretary of the Alfred Adler Institute of Minnesota. The new address of the Institute is 109 E. Grant Street., Mpls., Minnesota 55403. This is the same address of the Minnesota Adlerian Society.

MRS. LILLY EHRLICH showed Dr. Dreikur's film, "Family Counseling" to an energetic group of 35 young people in her East Orange, New Jersey office on February 13, 1972. She reports that the discussion which followed the film led to an enthusiastic proposal by the group to form a Family Education Center. The editors urge Mrs. Ehrlich to keep us informed about further progress.

DR. DALE ISAACS has been serving as chairman of evaluation for school psychologists. One item the eleven school psychologists will be evaluated on is, The ABILITY TO STUDY THE LIFE STYLE OF A SCHOOL BUILDING AND DEVISE WAYS TO IMPROVE THE LIFE STYLE IN ORDER TO HUMANIZE THE PROGRAM. Dr. Harold Mosak, from the Chicago Adler Institute, spent three years as a psychological consultant to the Welsh program in Rockford. The Welsh program is in its fifth year of operation and it is one of nine schools Dr. Isaacs functions as a

psychologist. The Welsh elementary school has become an effective therapeutic operational school designed to meet children's emotional and cognitive needs and combined with effective relationship teaching and parental training and guidance. Welsh influences 26 other elementary schools with trained teachers and principals.

McIntosh, one of the 26 other schools, is in the process of changing its life style. It has about 600 children from K thru 5 with 35% of the enrollment black. Last year the teachers made a definite committment to humanize the program. In a year's time some of the teachers, principal, and other service personnel have met with Dr. Isaacs over 80 times so they will have a better understanding of themselves, the children, and the parents. They have also learned to function cooperatively together as a unit. All teachers have held classroom discussions with their pupils as recommended by both Dreikurs and Glasser. A strong parent group is beginning to form after 20 parents took a ten week course from the psychologist and the social worker using Children: The Challenge as a text. More courses are on the drawing board for parents at their request. McIntosh doesn't have the funds like Welsh for outside consultants and teacher release time for concentrated in-service training but it is making big strides in providing cognitive and affective developmental activities for pupils, teachers, and parents.

"SELECTED READINGS ON ALFRED ADLER AND HIS INDIVIDUAL PSYCHOLOGY" is the title of a bibliography prepared by Charles Harvey Miley, Chairman, Department of Psychology, Aurora College, Aurora, Illinois 60507. This bibliography was prepared to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Birthday of Alfred Adler, February 7, 1970.

INTERNATIONAL SUMMER SCHOOL PLANS are underway to conduct an International Adlerian Summer School in Hawaii in August. The two-week school will host a faculty from various schools and institutes throughout the country. University of Hawaii is offering 3 hours of course credit. #### CORPORAL PUNISHMENT

Civil Liberties, a publication of the American Civil Liberties Union, contained an article in its February 1972 issue by Nat Hentoff titled "Corporal Punishment: The Beat Goes On." This article disclosed several cases of corporal punishment in schools in several states. One such case is pending in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of West Virginia (School Committee Vs. W.Va. Board of Education). That alleged case was described in the article as follows:

"In an affidavit, the father of one of the plaintiffs, a nine-year old, states:

"On or about April 15, 1971, my son...was paddled in school for allegedly possessing bubble gum and potatoe chips while in the confines of Cass District Elementary School. The bubble gum and potatoe chips had been purchased for (my son) by the janitor of the Cass District Elementary School during the day. (My son) was black and blue on the back of his thighs and had a splinter on the back of his left thigh, which was removed that very day. The marks extended on the small of his back to the back of his legs."

The accomplice janitor apparently went scot free, but that nine-year old certainly did get taught a lesson. In what, though?"

The verdict in this case has not been decided. It seems that the American Civil Liberties Union is very interested in cases involving corporal punishment in the schools.

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"RESULT OF A TEST: F". A Time article in the February 14, 1972—issue,
"Pesult of a Test: F" described the results of OEO sponsored school performance contracts during the 1970-71 school year.

"It authorized up to \$7.2 million for the project, spread among
six educational firms and conducted
in 18 school districts in both big
cities and rural areas. The subjects
of the year-long experiment were
13,000 children in grades one to three
and seven to nine.

Last week, OEO announced the results of the test - a failure. "The overall differences are so slight." said OEO, "that we can conclude performance contracting was no more effective in either reading or math than the traditional classroom methods of instruction." OEO stressed that the findings do not mean that the idea is necessarily wrong, but it added that "an uncritical rush to embrase the concept is unwarrented at this time."

Post-mortems thus far indicate that contractors may indeed have relied too much on computerized teaching machines and programmed reading materials."

Mr. James B. Cooney, Jr. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa writes:

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Three of us, here in the Cedar Rapids office of Hillcrest discovered Individual Psychology about 1½ years ago. Since then a parents organization Services to Children and Youth, has developed (Family Education Organization, Box 1632, Cedar Rapids, Iowa 52406). This month Hillcrest and FEO will begin operating a Center once a month until the need grows for more frequent meetings.

DR. JAMES W. CROAKE reports that the Florida Adlerian Association, 1556 Marcia Avenue, Tallahassee, Florida 32304 has officially incorporated. Nancy Catlin is president. The F.A.A. and the Florida State University Interdivisional Program in Marriage and Family Living are presently sponsoring 8 parent education groups, one prenatal group for pregnant women and mates, and one single parent group for women.

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FORMER WVU STUDENT STARTS NEW GROUP.

Sister Delores Myers, St. Thomas the Apostle School, West Hempstead, New York reports she stopped at the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago and picked up a number of books. Dee was a student at West Virginia University's EPDA program. She has started a Family Education Center which she says is well attended. She has started a study group for expecting mothers and the fathers.

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AUSTRALIA - SAD NEWS Mr. Ferdinand Ray, a nephew of Dr. Alfred Adler, died of a heart attack in Bentleigh, Australia. He had been a faithful reporter for this newsletter and was a very active worker in the Adlerian movement. He is survived by his wife, Trude, and two sisters.

EMIL FROESCHELS, M.D., first director of the Alfred Adler Institute of New York died recently in the Wiskersham Institute, New York. He was a life member of the American Society of Adlerian Psychology.
