THE PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

A publishing event of great importance to members of ASAP, to the continued growth of the Individual Psychology movement, and to the world of scholarly research is about to occur. A contract to publish the complete *Bibliography of Adlerian Psychology* has been made between Harold H. and Birdie Mosak -- the authors -- and Hemisphere Publishing Company in Washington, D.C.

This is a monumental work of scholarship. It includes over 9,000 entries, covering the full range of articles and books dealing with Individual Psychology in all languages, beginning with the original writings of Alfred Adler and his co-workers, and including everything written and published on IP since.

The Mosaks have been at work on this book for many years. It is impossible even to guess at the number of hours of research, recording, indexing, and proofreading which they have already invested in this undertaking. Since a book of this character and scope can expect to enjoy only a limited sale of copies, chiefly to libraries, historians, and researchers in the social sciences, it is unlikely that they will be in any way recompensed for the investment of their time and skills, save in the satisfaction that comes from knowing how much they have thereby contributed to other scholars.

It was not easy to find a publisher for this work, because of its limited commercial value. One university press, after months of deliberation, wrote almost in mourning over their regret at not having room in their budget for such an important book. One publisher wanted the Mosaks to reduce the manuscript to 25% of its completed size.

When I learned of this proposed mutilation of the manuscript, I asked the Mosaks for permission to take the matter before the Executive Committee of the Society. My hope was that, with our support and assistance, a publisher could be encouraged to believe not only in the importance of the book, but also that it would not require a financial sacrifice to put it into print.

The Mosaks welcomed our interest and assistance and now we have the publisher. An agreement between the publisher and ASAP will insure an initial printing of 2,000 copies of the book. The agreement stipulates that the Hemisphere Publishing Corporation will spend \$11,000 to print the book at an estimated per copy retail cost of \$17.50. ASAP will provide \$2,000 for the costs involved in promotion of the book's sale, and members of ASAP will be entitled to a 10% discount.

The Executive Committee is hoping to raise this \$2,000 by subscription, so that no money will have to be taken out of our regular (and, as always, limited) corporate funds.

On September 7 and 8, the following members of the Executive Committee met in Chicago: President Powers, Vice-Presidents Gold and Walton, Secretary Nash, and Treasurer Bartholow. Past-President O'Connell was unable to attend. Also in attendance was Executive-Secretary McClory. Some of the items of business which may be of interest to the general membership are these:

- 1. As noted in the September Newsletter, the increasing activity of the ASAP Central Office, plus his full-time responsibilities as President of the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, prompted Executive-Secretary McClory to ask the Society for a replacement. Those interested in taking on the work of the Executive-Secretary at the Central Office (which includes editing the monthly Newsletter) may apply to Bob Powers.
- 2. The Committee was in agreement that Region 1 (Far West) is geographically too extensive. It was the Committee's consensus that the number of regions can be increased as the Society grows. When that time comes, the growth of Region 1 and regional partitions should be actively encouraged. The Committee envisions regional partitions in the West no later than the 1976 Annual Meeting. At each Semi-Annual Delegate Assembly, the delegates will review the geographic spread and questions of regional membership and distribution.
- 3. In response to a request from Region I for some ASAP support for a regional meeting, the Committee asked the Region to submit a written proposal. The Committee also noted that ASAP pays the entire cost for members who attend the Executive Committee meetings and offers partial reimbursement to all members of the Delegate Assembly for two meetings yearly.
- 4. Adlerian organizations will be asked to encourage membership in ASAP, and Powers will contact the president of each society.
- 5. The Journal of Individual Psychology, The Individual Psychologist, and ASAP Newsletter will henceforth be sent to all affiliated societies for their libraries.
- 6. Powers will write to all Adlerian organizations asking for their affiliation with ASAP and an organizational contribution for the work of the Society.
- 7. Each member of the Task Force on Training has been asked to submit his recommendations for a report at the Semi-Annual Meeting.
- 8. The increasing sales of *Alfred Adler: His Influence on Psychology Today*, edited by Harold Mosak, have brought ASAP royalties of \$752 thus far.
- 9. The extensive Adlerian bibliography compiled by Harold and Birdie Mosak has been accepted for publication by the Hemisphere Publishing Company. ASAP has offered some limited financial assistance, hopefully to be raised by contributions.
- 10. Following the conditions noted in the By-laws, the following persons were approved as Life Members of the Society: Celia R. Harrison, Aurelia Ruzov, and Abraham Waxman. Eleanore Redwin, whose Life Membership was approved in May, 1973, has also been informed. (In the flurry of activities after the 1973 Annual Meeting, the President, regrettably, neglected to convey a formal notice of the change, and it was therefore not properly recorded in our records.)

RESEARCHERS, RESEARCHEES, AND READERS OF IT

The Research Committee of the American Society of Adlerian Psychology is compiling a list of persons who are interested or who have engaged in scientific inquiry on issues related to Individual Psychology. This letter is, therefore, an appeal to you, the members and affiliated societies, to contribute now to this unprecedented publication. Whatever you can give will help to insure a wider knowledge of Alfred Adler's Individual Psychology, and a greater influence for his all-too-long neglected contributions.

To encourage the success of this appeal, Dr. Joseph Meiers, the historian of the Society, has made the first pledge of a gift of \$500!

ICASSI CROSS-FERTILIZATION Tee Dreikurs

The Rudolf Dreikurs Summer Institute was an opportunity for cross-fertilization and leavening for the faculty itself. We met four times for two-hour periods and exchanged ideas. For example, the Israelis are experimenting with early recollections in group psychotherapy as a short cut to Life Style; they elaborated upon their work with "stress therapy," and the Athenians expounded upon their work within the community. The faculty felt refreshed and inspired by the exchange and learned a great deal from one another. Next year's summer school will be held in Greece ('75), followed by Austria ('76), Italy ('77), and Israel ('78).

CALL FOR PAPERS Symposium on Scientific Inquiry in Adlerian Psychology

I would like to invite your participation in the second Symposium on Scientific Inquiry in Adlerian Psychology. The symposium will be part of the next ASAP meeting to be held in New York in May, 1975. The purpose of the symposium is to stimulate and improve empirical and theoretical investigation into issues and activities of concern to Individual Psychology. Papers are being solicited which suggest new strategies, research designs, measurement instruments or procedures, and methods for data analysis related to researchable questions, concepts and propositions in Adlerian Psychology. Also welcome are 1) critiques of the current status of these areas, 2) papers which illuminate the process of deriving testable hypotheses from Adlerian theory and which also present plausible research strategies for testing these hypotheses, and 3) papers which represent basic conceptual elaboration and theoretical development in Adlerian Psychology. Note that mention of individual empirical studies will be relevant, but only to support a broader statement concerning theory or methodology per se.

REGION 1--FAR WEST

Vancouver, British Columbia. On Oct. 24 and 27, Bill and Mim Pew will be setting up a temporary Marriage Education Center in Vancouver, sponsored by the British Columbia Association of Adlerian Psychology. During the intervening days, Oct. 25-26, the Pews will be featured in an open conference at the annual meeting on Family and Marriage Counseling sponsored by the Canadian Guidance and Counseling Association.

REGION 2--MIDWEST

Chicago, Illinois. The Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago announces a new program this Fall in Arts Therapy designed especially for counselors, occupational and art therapists, and teachers. The program will include an introduction to group approaches through art therapy and demonstration through participation in the process. The program is under the supervision of Sadie Dreikurs.

In addition to the Art Therapy Laboratory conducted under the direction of Sadie Dreikurs, students will be provided with training in the principles and techniques of Individual Psychology through courses designed to train effective therapists, and will work with groups of clients through the Rudolf Dreikurs Psychological Services Center, combining clinical and academic experiences. Beyond this, the Institute plans to include in the program optional training in various art forms as therapeutic techniques. Hence the expression "Arts Therapy Program." Write to AAI for details.

On Wednesday, $\underline{\text{Oct. 23}}$ at 8:00 p.m., a new Family Learning Program will provide the students of the Institute and the general public with public family counseling demonstrations. $\underline{\text{Bob}}$ $\underline{\text{Powers}}$ will co-counsel. While training students to do public family counseling, the program will also familiarize the participants with the workings of a Family Education Center and offer to the community an opportunity to experience the effectiveness of Adlerian techniques. REGION 3--SOUTH

Montgomery, Alabama. We are pleased to present the following report on Adlerian activities in Alabama, and especially at the Maxwell Air Force Base, from <u>John J. Bradwell</u>, a Major who is stationed there and who was formerly a member of the Florida Adlerian Society. Bradwell has organized a sizable group of parents at the base and in Montgomery who are interested in forming an Alabama Adlerian Society. He writes:


I was in a two-year Master's program in counselor education at Florida State University from 1971-73 where I had the privilege of taking courses from two Adlerians --Dr. James Croake and Dr. Don Kelly. Dr. Croake endorsed my application for membership in ASAP.

In January of this year I approached the Wing Chaplain to see if he would support parent study groups based upon *Children: The Challenge*. He supported the idea and let me give a lay sermon on Sunday morning. The sermon was built on three principles of child-rearing: encouragement, logical and natural consequences, and stimulating independence. Forty-five parents signed up for two groups which were led by my wife, Kathleen, and me. The groups met from January through March. Perhaps we established one "first" for a study group; in attendance was a POW and his wife. He had spent six years in the Hanoi Hilton.

In April, Kathleen and I led a third group of 20 parents, half of whom were from the Montgomery community. On March 26 I was asked to address the Montgomery Mental Health Round Table. Approximately 60 persons were in attendance. The presentation was entitled "New Hope for Today's Parents: The Adlerian Approach to Child Rearing." In April I was asked to make the same presentation to the personnel assigned to the Base Mental Health Unit.

In July, I was asked to make a two-hour presentation to the wives of junior officers who are attending the 11-week Squadron Officer School at Maxwell. The presentation was part of a wives' enrichment program, and was entitled "Psychology for Today's Parents." There were 350 wives in attendance. Afterward 75 wives signed up for study groups. These four groups are being led by parents who completed the 10-week course earlier in the year. The wives will scatter to all parts of the United States at the end of the month and a new group will arrive in October when I will again present the lecture. If I knew where active groups are meeting across the United States, I could let these wives know as they go to new assignments.

As a faculty member of the Academic Instructor and Allied Officer School, I lecture to a class of approximately 120 students every six weeks. These students are acquainted with some Adlerian concepts and, as above, scatter to all parts of the United States where they might become actively involved in the Adlerian movement. As you can see, we have an active movement going in the Montgomery area. We are interested in getting a Society started here as soon as possible. Any help you can give us would be appreciated. I definitely need to have the location of active groups across the country.



Workshop in August for teacher-counselor teams, Peggy Smyly reports that four teacher groups have been organized in the Leon County district schools. This is encouraging, since Adlerian-oriented teacher groups have not been done before in this area. Maintaining Sanity in the Classroom and Winning Children Over are the basic materials being used, along with other Adlerian books and articles for supplementary reading. The county is granting in-service training credit toward certification renewal for these study groups.

Don and Linda Price have moved to DeKalb, Illinois, where Linda is beginning her studies at AAI of Chicago in September, and Don is teaching marriage and family courses at Northern Illinois University in DeKalb. Peggy Smyly writes, for all members of the Florida Adlerian Society, that "We will miss this delightful couple -- we wish to both, success, peace and joy."

<u>Tee Dreikurs</u> will be in Tallahassee the first weekend in November to do an Art Therapy workshop on <u>Nov. 2</u> for the Florida Adlerian Society and interested community participants. They are eagerly looking forward to this "first" for their area.

Following his recent visit to Orlando, Frank Walton will be in Tallahassee Oct. 25, and in Tampa on Oct. 31, as consultant for the Florida State Department of Education in a project designed to spread the use of Adlerian parent and teacher groups throughout the Florida schools.

Frank will visit Miami Beach and two other Florida cities before the project is completed this year. Floridians interested in having representatives from their schools attend these workshops may contact Ms. Billie Jackson, State Elementary Guidance Supervisor.

Aynor, South Carolina. Frank Walton will be traveling to Aynor periodically this year as the consultant for a \$100,000 project funded under Title III-Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The project was funded specifically for the purpose of improving achievement and lessening student apathy through application of Adlerian principles and technique by the faculty of the junior and senior high schools. Aynor schools serve a large, sparsely populated region consisting predominantly of family-run tobacco farms.

Columbia, South Carolina. The Fourth Annual Summer Workshops devoted to applications of Adlerian psychology at the University of South Carolina attracted 204 participants from the Southeast. The staff included Bob Powers, Harold Mosak, Kitty Altman, Ron Quinn, Dan Eckstein, and Kathy and Frank Walton.

The new Adlerian Child Care Center and Kindergarten opened by Kathy and Frank Walton began on schedule, in spite of being plagued by building delays from torrential hurricane-inspired rains. IN DEFENSE OF BOUNDARY-EXTENSION

Los Angeles, California, Sept. 6

I was distressed to find several letters calling for better screening of programs at ASAP conventions to reduce the possibility that programs that deviate from "true" Adlerian Psychology would be presented. The opinions seemed to be generated primarily in reaction to presentations made by Bob Postel and his associates. Personally, I found the presentation on Primary Relationship Therapy which I attended to be very stimulating and valuable.

It is extremely dangerous to have an individual or group determine what programs should be included at ASAP conventions on the basis of whether they are strictly "Adlerian" or not. This encourages an autocratic and reactionary decision-making process. On the contrary, the continued encouragement of ideas which extend the boundaries and influence of Individual Psychology is not only desirable—it is vital to the growth and viability of Individual Psychology. Growth requires the courage to examine new ideas and techniques and to wrestle with the questions they raise, such as where these new concepts and methods extend basic philosophy and theory and where they are inconsistent with it. This process, requiring as it does the re-examination of fundamental principles, can only be healthy and stimulating to those interested in developing Individual Psychology.

There is a diverse membership in the Adlerian ranks, and not all who come to an ASAP convention will be interested in being exposed to new ideas. But whereas some people might react with confusion to new ideas (such as those presented by Maurie Bullard, Bill Pew, and Bob Postel), others will react with excitement and take on the task of integrating and/or distinguishing between these new ideas and more familiar ones. There must be room for both in Adlerian Psychology. Instead of omitting these innovative presentations, perhaps it would be more appropriate to indicate which programs present new thoughts and ideas and which present traditional views so that people can choose in accordance with their interests and expectations.

ON SELLING PSYCHOLOGY

Chicago FEA was very interested in the letter from Sophia J. de Vries in the July/August Newsletter. We are pleased to hear that she feels well again and we are grateful for her admonishment of our organization for generating "social interest" while seeking a creative slogan to use as a bumper sticker. (She asks, "Do we sell psychology?" - and adds that "Adler would turn in his grave if he could see an Adlerian bumper sticker.")

Her admonishment engendered renewed questions and discussion regarding our organization's goals and our role in the community.

1. "Do we sell psychology?" There are many euphemisms which we prefer, but "selling" is what we do.

Don't we "sell" Adlerianism when we "make available" selected books to the community? Don't we "sell" ideas when we educate?
Don't we "sell" psychology when we advertise our Speakers Bureau?
(Or are we advance men and pitch men while our professional speakers are salesmen?)

2. How should we communicate with our neighbors? We advertise Family Counseling and Book Study Groups in store windows in our community. Five feet away our neighbors' car bumper tells us he wants to "Impeach Nixon" and "Save our Environment."

How do we communicate our interest to "Save our family-life" or "Encourage one another"? Some of our group seek the perfect form of communication with our community; some of us claim to have the "courage to be imperfect."

We must say, however, that many of our members believe bumper stickers to be too imperfect. The Board is in the process of composing answers to the authors of the favorite sticker slogan as well as the skywriting message. Should you see a Burma-Shave message, "Community life ... could be great ... if we would ... cooperate," be assured that Rudolf Dreikurs Unit of FEA, Chicago didn't do it ... but we can dream.

I have advocated that some form of quality control (perhaps certification) be developed by ASAP. Of course, there is always the problem of distance and money. People cannot be expected to travel thousands of miles to take required courses or have required experiences in order to qualify. But the use of a group of "original certifying group" spread across the nation (people accepted as competent to judge the competence of others) plus a series of modules based upon demonstrated competencies and knowledge may suffice.

I have included a set of modules we are in the process of developing here and which we will field-test this year. (See sample below.) While they are certainly not complete, nor are they in final form, they do portray a possible approach to offering experiences and courses to people without the constant need to leave their present setting for extended per-

iods of time.

I can see a commission being established to define "Adlerian Psychology," to identify the basic knowledge and skills required at several levels of competence and to develop modules around these identified competencies.

Ultimately, with the combined use of modules and persons selected somehow as competent in Adlerian psychology, a great deal of education as well as quality control could be achieved without a considerable amount of additional time or expense.

Sample modules:

Demonstrated ability to develop a team approach in adult counseling programs utilizing teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals, resource agencies, etc.

Demonstrated ability to be accepted by and to interact with a broad spectrum of individuals

including varied racial, ethnic, economic, and age groups.

Demonstrated knowledge of community resources through logical referral solutions based on specific problems (cases).

Demonstrated articulation of own personal counseling theory and the theoretical basis upon

which it is founded.

Demonstrated ability to conduct an interview for the purpose of accomplishing a specific outcome.

Demonstrated ability to carry out a one-to-one counseling session.
