PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends:

Thanks to chairpersons Becky McDonough, Olene Bigelow, Bob Bartholow and many other Minneapolis Adlerians, the Semiannual Meeting of the Society was a productive and enjoyable one.

The Delegate Assembly appropriated \$5,000 to subsidize regional and local Adlerian workshops and projects. Proposals for the use of a portion of these funds are to be made to the Executive Committee within each region. That Committee will then send the proposals and their recommendations to the NASAP Committee on Development for final approval. The Delegates also approved the revised constitution and Bylaws. Final approval of the revised documents rest with NASAP members. The Delegates, and especially Bob Powers, have spent a substantial amount of time on this revision in order to improve the efficiency of the Delegate Assembly.

Among other business conducted was the selection of Providence as the site of the Fall, 1978 Meeting; and the selection of Las Vegas as the site of the Spring, 1979 Meeting. The Delegates also approved the expansion of the <u>Individual Psychologist</u> from semiannual to quarterly publication.

OF GENERAL INTEREST

MEN AND WOMEN: PARTNERS IN COOPERATION

Adlerians have a proud tradition of advocacy for the equality of women. The 1977 ASAP Convention Forum, "Women and Men: Partners in Cooperation," led by Shirley Gould, Gloria

Lane and Janet Terner, highlighted this issue. Documentation from Heinz Ansbacher's new book, now in final preparation for publication, Cooperation Between the Sexes: Adler's Theories of Sexuality, lends historical perspective, such as Adler's insistance in 1885 that the woman question be included as a vital issue for the German Socialist Party, ". . . for there can be no liberation of mankind without social independence and equality of the sexes." He referred to the "excessive preeminence of maleness" as the "cancerous damage of our culture." In 1936 Adler wrote "Language denies to women the complete equality essential for love. We still say that a man 'takes' a wife. Words and proverbs in which the old prejudices still linger are more potent than most men realize. They keep false traditions alive and subtly corrupt our judgement. There should be no 'taking' in love or marriage,

but a mutual 'give and take.'"

Dreikurs also adhered to these principles. An unpublished manuscript, Marriage For One (1940's) was written to help women during the war who suddenly found themselves thrust into new roles in a giant leap toward equality. Dreikurs predicted the resumption of old roles in the '50's as well as women's return and advance at unprecedented levels in demands for equal position in family and society.

The forum also discussed the impact of changing roles on marriage and some reoccurring problems this generates in family education today; recommendations for single parents, new dating patterns, involvement of fathers in parent study groups, the Corsini technique for marital conference. A more complete summary of the session prepared by Shirley Gould including some suggested solutions to these problems is available, on request, from the Society.

Dorothy Peven also addressed the issue recently in a talk entitled, "Historical Perspectives of the Sexual Revolution: Reflections on the Feminist Movement from the Viewpoint of an Adlerian" at the Skokie, Illinois Jewish Community Adult Education Program. Also in Skokie, Bob Powers spoke on the subject "Love, Sex and Superiority: The Infernal Triangle."

In California Lynn Lott is teaching a class at Sonoma State College and County Mental Health entitled, "Women in Marriage" based on Dreikurs, O'Neills, Janoes and Wayne Dyor.

STUDY ALTERNATIVE PROGRAMS FOR ADLERIAN TRAINING

A commission to study alternative ways that persons may receive training and education within the Adlerian framework has been formed within Region I, in response to the need for those unable to leave work or trek to an Institute or University. Films, tapes, and correspondence courses will be considered as alternative ways to provide quality preparation. In addition this commission will examine various methods for assuring that training institutions, universities or per-

sons are offering quality services. Forms of certification or approval will also be examined. 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SERVICES TO THE WIDOWED

The 1970 Census counted twelve million widowed persons in the U.S.A. About 1.2 million people are widowed annually--the average age at which a person is widowed is 56. Over the past four years Widowed Persons Service of the National Retired Teachers Association and the American Association of Retired Persons has developed programs for the widowed in many different communities around the country. A new quarterly report designed to offer information, bring a sense of community to the variety of programs around the country and to provide a means for sharing hard-learned insights in understanding the needs of the widowed is now available.

If Adlerians are going to survive, we need more purposes for groups than parent-child. COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION: Summary of business pertaining to the Education Committee generated at SemiAnnual Meeting in Minneapolis:

- The Committee will develop contents for the Public Relations Brochure and forward it to the P.R. Committee for Production.
- 2. The Committee recommended support for the decision for alternative off-campus training program proposals that would lead to a certificate recognized by NASAP. Rowena Ansbacher has undertaken the coordination of information

from already existing certification programs.

- 3. Ms. Ansbacher also volunteered to coordinate the Special Interest Symposium for the Annual Convention in Washington to focus upon the relationship between current, innovative therapeutic practices and Individual Psychology.
- 4. Eight hundred dollars was allocated for the development of audio-visual materials--videotapes, films, audio tapes--that would be developed, reproduced and made available through the Society to members at large. If anyone has ideas regarding the use of some of these funds for the development of materials, please submit them to the Committee.
- 5. A proposal was made to move ahead on the development of a Code of Ethics.
- 6. Pre- and postconvention workshops were discussed recommending Thursday/Friday preconvention days for exposure to "lesser-known" Adlerians and Monday/Tuesday postconvention workshops for more experienced practitioners.

CALIFORNIA

ILLINOIS

AAI of Chicago—A four-person evaluating team appointed by the North Central Association visited the Institute from November 28 through November 30. They met with the members of the Board and faculty, administrative personnel and students, reviewed financial reports and budget, minutes of meetings, etc. In January the Institute will receive the evaluator's written re-

port and recommendation re full accreditation. The report and recommendation will be reviewed by the NCA Commission on Institutions of Higher Education at its April meeting, and the final decision will be made at that time. On the basis of the visit and the exit interview, the Institute is optimistic.

The Institute's Master's and certificate programs are not limited to Chicago area residents. Throughout the U.S. and Canada local Adlerian groups provide training in Adlerian Psychology which, in many cases, is applicable towards the Chicago Institute's degree or certificate. Please contact the Institute for details.

In a recent survey, a large majority of local Institute students indicated their preference for evening courses rather than weekend courses. Since scheduling must primarily meet the needs of the local students, few weekend courses have been scheduled during the Winter and Spring quarters. However, the summer schedule of courses will be arranged primarily for the benefit of out-of-town students with courses taught in a more concentrated manner. The schedule for this Summer will be available in February.

ADLER AND FREUD 2ND GENERATION DISAGREE

During the Pathfinders Series last fall featuring Alfred Adler, Dr. Kurt Adler, commenting upon the attraction between Freud and Adler, noted, "My father used to be a practicing general physician. A step-brother of Freud's was sick with pneumonia and had been given up. My father was called in because he was known to be a very good diagnostian and a very good physician. He saved the step-brother's life."

This report in The Relay, together with other matters, stimulated Ms. Carol Lynn Morse, a graduate student at the University of Oregon, to correspond with Anna Freud in England. Dr. Freud replied, "I can say with absolute certainty that my father never had a step-brother in Vienna. He had a younger brother, Alexander, ten years younger than himself. He also had a much older step-brother who lived in England." Dr. Freud continues, "I am sorry to say that I have no knowledge about the initial meeting between my father and Dr. Adler."

Thus, the mystery continues.
