FREUD/ADLER DEBATE CONTINUES

Maurice Bullard of Corvallis, Oregon has provided additional information on the conflicting statements of Kurt Adler and Anna Freud regarding the original meeting of the two "greats." (Vol. XVIII, No. 1, OSIP NewsLetter). Mr. Bullard notes that correspondence with Kurt Adler clarifies earlier remarks made during a symposium at the University of Oregon in 1976. Kurt Adler writes that "It was Freud's brother, not his step-brother--that is how my father related it to me. He did not say that this is how Freud came to invite him into the group; but, since my father practiced medicine before he became a psychiatrist, I concluded this is how they met."

New York, NY, 1/11/78: Dear Ms. Schecht, May I make a correction: on page 2 (of the January Newsletter) it says that Adler insisted "in 1885..."At that time Alfred Adler was 15 years old and I wonder whether this error should be corrected. With my best wishes. Sincerely, Alexandra Adler, M.D.

Burlington, VT, 1/14/78: Dear Ms. Schecht, Sorry to have to call your attention to an error in the January Newsletter, page 2, right-hand column. The first quotation there is indeed from 1885. 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NASAP '78 DARE TO CARE

"Dare to Care" about each other in work, love and friendship. This is the theme of NASAP '78, our 26th Annual Convention and Workshops. The Washington, D.C. planning committee is focusing its attention on families, schools and psychotherapy this year and is arranging many demonstrations and practical problem-solving sessions.

The convention will begin at noon on Thursday May 25, with some miniworkshops, a new feature. The keynote address on Thursday evening promises to be exciting; plans for the speeches will be disclosed very soon. Preconvention workshops on Friday, regular convention sessions on Saturday and Sunday, and postconvention workshops on Monday and Tuesday will be scheduled in a manner similar to past years. The convention is opening one day early this year to accommodate members' desires to tour Washington, D.C. in conjunction with the meeting.

NASAP '78 should leave its mark on the nation's capitol. An active public relations program is being planned to bring our ideas and techniques to the attention of government officials.

The planning committee is also providing for the needs of vacationing families. A full schedule of sightseeing and entertaining activities is being arranged for children who accompany their parents. Civil Air Patrol cadets have volunteered to give guided tours of the new Air and Space Museum. Visits will also be made to the Capitol, the White House, the Smithsonian, and National Zoo and other places of interest.

A call for convention programs was mailed to all members at the end of December along with a two page news release on convention plans which local societies may want to share with their members. All program proposals should be returned by no later than February 15, 1978 in order to be considered.

Anyone planning to attend NASAP '78 should come prepared to work and play very hard.

I would like to invite your participation in the Fifth Symposium on Scientific Inquiry in Individual Psychology. The symposium will be part of the next NASAP meeting to be held in Washington, D.C. in May 1978. The purpose of the symposium is to stimulate and improve empirical and theoretical investigation into issues and activities of concern to Individual Psychology.
