PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends:

I would like to share some ideas that come to mind as I work in schools in various parts of the U.S. and Canada. Evidence abounds that the major problem in our schools is not overt rebellion. Violence and disruption get the headlines, and truly are troublesome, but the major problem in the schools at this time is the silent majority.

Students and teachers are consistent in their estimates that the typical student is productively involved in learning for not more than half of the average class period. Often the estimates of productive involvement are much lower. If these estimates are anywhere near correct, the waste involved may well constitute our greatest misuse of natural resources.

Students usually agree that apathetic behavior is a passive and subtle use of power and that the private logic of the apathetic student is substantially as follows:

You (Mr. or Ms. Teacher/Administrator) are going to tell us what to do, when to do it, and how to do it. It's clear that we can't change anything. We can't fight city hall, so I'll tell you what you can do, Mr./Ms. Teacher. You can have it! It's your class room. It's your school—on the other hand, I want to get out of this place some day, so I'll do enough academic work to get by (that's for me). You can bet I won't do any more than enough to get by (that's for you).

These young people seldom see any course of action open to them to begin to stimulate change. Apparently we've taught them too well that such decisions are out of their hands.

NASAP '78: CONVENTION UPDATE

Twenty pre- and post-convention workshops will complement the 26th annual NASAP meeting in Washington, D.C. from May 25 to 30, 1978. The convention will open at noon on Thursday with a 1 1/2 day workshop on Conflict Management in the School, presented by Robert Tafoya, Sacramento, California.

Mini-workshops on Friday will be presented by Charles McElvaney on Maximizing Participation in Group Counseling; Jackie Brown, Multi-Cultural Communities; Andrea Williams, Aerobic Dance TM; Lewis Lasoncy, Turning People On; Weltha Logan, Women's Issues; and Katharine Kenneth, Adlerian Theory in the Montessori Classroom.

Also on Friday, personnel from the Elk Grove School District, California, will give a day-long workshop on Implementing Adlerian Programs in the Schools; and Don Kelley is planning an all-day session on Youth Programs at Boys' Town, Nebraska. Sadie Dreikurs will present an all-day Art Therapy Workshop.

Post-convention workshops on Monday, May 29, will include Maurice Ouellet and others on Religion and Psychology; Harold Mosak, Therapeutic Community; Adaline Starr, Psychodrama; Richard Kopp, Intensive Life Style Interviewing.

Workshops running both Monday and Tuesday will feature Kurt Adler, topic to be announced; Oscar Christianson, Single Parents and New Families; Ray Corsini, Individual Education; Ray Lowe, Multiple Family Counseling; Harold Mosak, topic to be announced; Mim and Bill Pew, Adult Intimate Relationships; and Frank Walton, Winning Cooperation of Teenagers.

Bob Powers has agreed to be Master of Ceremonies for the opening keynote evening on Thursday, May 25. The theme will be the American Family: New Patterns—New Possibilities. A panel composed of Adlerians and other prominent figures in the area of Family Relations will interact with a notable political figure.

NASAP '78: TRAVEL TIPS

The airlines have instituted new Excursion Fare plans that should definitely benefit convention travelers planning to attend NASAP '78. The fares are approximately twenty percent below coach travel and can apply to any trip that starts in one calendar week and finishes in another calendar week. The way to get these fares is to plan early, reserve early and pay early. Reservations and payments must usually be made at least seven days in advance. The advance time is determined by seat availability on any particular flight. A certain number of excursion seats is reserved on each flight. When these are full, only coach fares are sold.

Group travel is now defined by some airlines as four or more people. Group rates are roughly comparable to excursion rates but may be more advantageous depending on

travel dates. For more information on these travel arrangements, members may want to consult a local travel agency. Travelers are not charged for the agency's services

THE HAZARDS OF BEING MALE: SURVIVING THE MYTH OF MASCULINE PRIVILEGE

The News Release and abstract for the AAI of Minnesota Workshop may interest other Adlerians. The Hazards of Being Male: Surviving the Myth of the Masculine Privilege," to be conducted on April 7, 8, by Herbert Goldberg, Ph.D., author of the book with the same title, at the West Bank Auditorium, University of Minnesota. The following is a summary of the book abstract by the NASAP Newsletter Staff:

The male in our culture finds himself in countless "damned-if-you-do, damned-if-you-do, damned-if-you-don't" binds. He is constantly being torn by gross inconsistencies between what he had been taught was "masculine" behavior as a boy and what is expected of him as an adult; between inner needs and social pressures . . for survival's sake he must function like a machine, emotionally detached and repressed. Clinical evidence suggests that this emotional "shallowness" is simply a self-protective device to

disguise the intensity of his need. He resists closeness and dependency on the female because once his defenses are penetrated he becomes profoundly attached to the point of deep and almost total dependency. When he loses that primary relationship he frequently finds he can't let go and this precipitates considerable self-destructive behavior.

In adult male-male relationships in our culture, the phenomenon of being without even a single close male friend is common—so widespread it is taken for granted. The lack of such a relationship makes a man particularly vulnerable. It overintensifies his dependency on his mate, which can ultimately suffocate and destroy the relationship.

The "liberationists" have bought the myth that the male is culturally favored—a notion that continues despite the fact that every critical statistic in the area of longevity, disease, suicide, crime, accidents, childhood emotional disorders, alcoholism and drug addiction, etc., reveals a disproportionately higher male rate.

The feminist and humanist growth movements have helped create a social climate conducive to altering such rigid and harmful patterns . . . but men will have to arrive at their own realizations of what is crucial to their survival and well-being. The freeing of the male will come . . . when he reclaims his total self, coming increasingly in contact with his own unique and individual style rather than by rigid role casting, imaging and expectations that result in repetitive, stereotyped responses.

REGIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

REGION I: The following letter has been received from the Western Institute for Research and Training in Humanics, Inc. (WIRTH), Berkeley, California: "Other California Adlerians may be interested to know that the California Legislature has quietly passed a bill sponsored by Berman and Miller (AB 246) concerning Psychoanalytic licensing. According to this bill only the four orthodox Psy-

choanalytic Institutes in California have a right to train and educate Psychoanalysts. Their graduates only can be licensed to practice Psychoanalysis in California. All training has to be done by medical Psychoanalysts.

There are as of now three Adlerian Training Institutes affiliated with the National Accreditation Association of Psychoanalysis (New York, Chicago and WIRTH). NAAP has applied for recognition at the U.S. Commissioner of Education at the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and is the only national accreditation association accrediting Adlerians, Jungians and Freudians whose recognition by HEW is pending and will probably be granted in September of 1978.

The California law, so NAAP claims, is unconstitutional and disenfranchises many practitioners who already practice, train and educate in Psychoanalysis as understood by NAAP. It even deprives them of the right to study Adlerian, Jungian or Freudian Psychoanalysis. WIRTH, in connection with NAAP, is fighting for a needed amendment to this California law and is hoping that other Adlerians in California will join in this effort to fight for a broader accreditation law."

ADLERIAN SCHOOL PROJECT WINS ACCLAIM

The U.S. Office of Education has cited the RIPPS program in Portsmouth, New Hampshire as one of the 150 exemplary education programs across the nation. This is exciting news for Adlerians since parent study groups and Adlerian thinking are basic to the Reading Instruction and Pupil Personnel Services. Specially designed to help Portsmouth school children (K-10) experience success in school, the program includes two types of trained educators, Reading Specialists (for instruction) and Pupil Personnel Services Specialists (Guidance Counselors, School Psychologists, Social Worker, Case Aide, Consulting Psychologist, and Psychiatrist). How well the child learns and the methods by which he learns are considered in direct relation to the child's emotional, social, physical health and intellectual potential. Eightyfive percent of the 350 children demonstrated substantial gains from the program. Phyllis Martin Grimes, Coordinator of RIPPS has noted a positive correlation between parent participation in the group and improvement in the child's behavior and school achievement. Ms. Grimes received her advanced professional training at University of Vermont, the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, the Gesell Institute, Connecticut and the University of Rhode Island Family and Marriage Counselors Training Workshops. She has taught at the Alfred Adler Institute of Rhode Island. More information on this project is available through Education In Action, U.S. Office of Education, Washington, D.C. 20202

This site "sacked by Queen Boadicea at the time when St. Paul was sending his Epistles to the new churches, possessing a complete second-century well and the biggest Norman keep in Europe in foundations made by men who were contemporary with Christ, is an enthralling place," states the Shell Guide to England.

"Queen Boadicea was eventually defeated and the ruined city revived to become a walled city and one of the most important Roman Centers in Britain. After the Romans left, the town was the victim of invasions in turn by the Anglo-Saxons, the Danes and finally the Normans.

Early in its history, Colchester was the Center of the cloth making industry initiated by Flemish refugees. Today it is famous principally for its oysters, engineering, the growing of roses, and the University of Essex, the newest of the post-war Universities.

A collection of Roman and other antiquities may be viewed at the Colchester and Essex Museum. Colchester, according to reports, has the best small zoo in the country at Stanway."
