PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members

As you receive this Newsletter, on the West coast the daffodil and crocuses, our harbingers of Spring, are blooming brightly. This message will point to the current indications of equally promising seasons ahead for our Society and Adlerian Psychology. Since the "We" feeling is essential for appropriate action and commitment, what evidence of its development do we have?

Firstly, members have shown a strong interest in nominating for the Delegate Assembly by filling more nominees than required for vacancies in all but one region. Involvement is indicated by the new memberships, especially in the Participating and Family categories, as well as a significant number of renewals of lapsed members.

Remember our goal of 2,000 by the time of the annual meeting. At the time of going to press, we had 870 members, 1,130 to go!

Secondly, the "re-run" of the Phil Donahue show featuring Bob Powers found the central office deluged with over 700 letters and calls inquiring about Adlerian family education and counseling resources throughout the continent. These letters will be forwarded to the network of local societies. This not only points to the effectiveness of the media to attract people to our work, but also to the need for it. To assist local organizations to continue from this second impressive response, information about a pilot project on radio spots will appear in the next Newsletter.

Thirdly, the balanced budget Neva Hefner reports for the end of 1979 is another sign of sound management and partial recovery from the two financially difficult years. This was accomplished by paring expenditures for Executive Committee, JIP, Regions and Committees and the \$4,658.28 (\$5,000 Canadian) the Society realized

from the fine efforts of the Edmonton affiliate.

Fourthly, planning for the Annual Convention in Amherst began in an atmosphere of social interest with Marie Hartwell-Walker, Lawrence Belove and an enthusiastic interested local group. Further belongingness is anticipated for participants not only through the campus facilities but from a program and workshops directed to the full range of professional groups and interest within the membership.

Each month the reports in the Newsletter from the regions are encouraging and informative. Could there be more direct inter- and intra-regional communication and sharing? Do the other regions receive copies of the "Relay" from Region I? Is it time to consider changing the boundaries so that regions are smaller and more acceptable?

In Edmonton, in discussion with Sydney Roth, he emphasized that COOPERATION BETWEEN THE SEXES was such a timely book that every NASAP member should own a copy. One of my gift recipients, an avid reader, returned from Hawaii to report that he had confined his reading to COOPERATION BETWEEN THE SEXES and that of all the books he has used to spark an interest in and recognition of Adlerian Psychology among his friends and associates, this book was the most useful and appealing. One man's experience, but it indicates confirmation of Sydney Roth's intuition.

Finally, to help me personally with the "We" feeling, I welcome similar sharing and suggestions for this monthly message. Although the Spring flowers are showing their riot of color, at times one can feel alone out on the North Pacific Coast in terms of current NASAP issues.

More Donahue Letters

We heard from two people who knew about Individual Psychology some years ago and were glad to hear it is still around!

One was Janet McDowell in Philadelphia who heard Dr. Dreikurs in the 1930's when he talked at Lincoln Centre. The other is Helen Lambert, Carmel-by-the-Sea, CA, who wrote, "I believe my first contact was when I attended some lectures by Olga Knopf at the New School in the Village in New York. Later I did secretarial work for Phyllis Bottome, who was a good friend of the Adlers and helped them get out of Austria when Hitler moved in. She wrote his biography, which I typed for her, first during the war when she couldn't be too explicit about naming names, and another after the war when it could be more detailed...A.E. Forbes Dennis, Miss Bottome's husband, was working with children in London, using Adler's teachings, when I saw them both there in 1960 and 1962. I was really interested that his work may still be carried on some place."

Adler Remembrance

The following is quoted in its entirety from the Nov/Dec 1979 issue of IPNL (Individual Psychology News Letter, organ of International Association of Individual Psychology):

Gina Kaus lived in the Vienna of the 20's, participated, together with Otto Kaus, in the lecture-discussions which Adler held in his house and published a Journal for Mothers before she became a well-known novelist. In her autobiography, Und was flir cin Leben (And What a Life), Hamburg: Knaus, 1979, (to which Henry Jacoby kindly drew our attention) we find amongst other references to Adler, this paragraph:

"Competing for popularity, Freud was the winner. Here in America each one who is a reader knows his name--but nobody knows Adler. There are hundreds of psychoanalysts in Los Angeles, and all have long waiting lists. Occasionally I talk with patients and convince myself again and again that three-quarters of their analysis consists in the application of Adler's doctrine." (p. 101)

This confirms the correctness of what she heard Adler say in 1935 in a discussion with Freudians in New York: "It is unimportant for me under which names my ideas are used--as long as they are useful for patients." (p.101) (Editor's translation)

We hope very much that many of our German friends will read the whole book. They will find there interesting historical facts and aspects of the life of people who were young when Individual Psychology developed in Vienna and Berlin.

NASAP FORUM

A Challenge to Adlerians

Adlerian psychology, it seems, has been concerned primarily with private practice or educational endeavors. It seems that we need to broaden our perspectives so as not to limit such a significant psychology to these areas. The challenge to Adlerians is to begin thinking toward the effect the principles of Adlerian psychology can have upon public service agencies.

Recent literature (Allred, NASAP Newsletter, November, 1979) has indicated that the terminology of Individual Psychology is limiting and perhaps should be changed to something more encompassing, such as Holistic Psychology, thus suggesting something more than working with an individual. In a human service agency, it is extremely important to think of delivery of service to the community in a Holistic sense. Many areas of service exist in addition to individual psychotherapy and the occasional Family Education Center. Among these are services to foster parents and children, juveniles and adults in trouble, chemically dependent people, families, and a variety of others.

It is extremely important to begin thinking of the psychology of Adler as Adler thought of it; that is, a psychology of the people and to begin to work with the problems of the greater population of people in a fashion that enhances social interest of segments of society beyond those that seek private treatment or are exposed to the advantages of a higher educational institution. Adlerians must begin to think in the broader sense of the public that must be served. Adler worked extremely hard toward a model of public enlightenment through family education centers and public education. His work must be expanded in a more systematic way to include public agencies that serve all segments of society.

The human service professional working in the areas of mental health, mental retardation, chemical dependency, day treatment, social services, financial assistance, and corrections must have an awareness of the principles relating to the Holistic thinking of Adler. The possible impact of Adlerian thinking upon the general public becomes vividly apparent when we consider that in a comparatively prosperous county of 53,000 people that approximately 8,000 of those people are active clients of the human service agency. This figure may be higher in areas of poverty. Further impact may be seen through the educational efforts of Family and Marriage Education Centers and other

consultation and education efforts in the communities.

It seems that the psychology of Adler can have a much more significant impact upon the society through the human service agencies that exist in every county in this country.

The message of this short challenge to Adlerians is that we need to begin to pay much more attention to societal needs through public agencies.

Dreikurs worked toward involvement of the public. Pew, in his later years, worked with the public through the human service agency with great satisfaction.

It is time that those of us, as Adlerians, look at the reality of the American society and begin to work with the greater population that Adler, Dreikurs and Pew were concerned about. We, as Adlerians, can have a greater affect upon the society of this country and can affect the social interest of those people that we serve.
