PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

Following the annual meeting in Amherst, I neglected in the last President's message to express appreciation and admiration to Edna Nash, now Past President, for her sensitive and skilled leadership during the past year. Her ability to accept ideas from all sources, coordinate and encourage their development, has been a great benefit to the Society.

In the last newsletter I did not mention that the Delegate Assembly heard a presentation by Larry Nissenbaum about ideas to further democratize the structure of the Society. One aspect of his discussion was somewhat parallel to what Region I is doing in the West; dividing regions into smaller units called sections. Since our membership is about 1400 and there are 30 delegate assembly persons, groupings of about 50 people would have a representative to the Delegate Assembly, making access to the Delegate Assembly easier. These and other ideas will be discussed by a committee chaired by John Symynkywicz, named the Ad Hoc Committee for the 80's. We welcome any suggestions or comments and they can be addressed to Neva Hefner at the central office, John, or myself.

The plans for the NASAP sponsored excursion seminar are progressing well. Drs. Shulman, Gold, Mosak, and Pancner, Dorothy Peven and Kristin Pancner have agreed to teach. Its

main emphasis will be towards physicians, family practitioners and their spouses. The workshops will be helpful to anyone in clinical practice. The title will be Applied Adlerian Psychology—The Unique Contribution of Alfred Adler's Psychology to Medical Practice. Through the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, Category I, Continuing Medical Education credits of the American Medical Association will be available. The Kirkland Travel Agency, whose office is in Kansas City, has a mailing list of 10,000 physicians. We are looking forward to a week on Mexico's West coast, hope that our effort will be successful and that this will be the first of an annual offering. A more complete agenda will be published at a later time.

Unfortunately at this date we still cannot give you the financial status of our Society. The Massachusetts University computer still has not produced the final data that we need. However, our thanks to the regions that have now contributed a total of \$1500.00 to NASAP to help balance the budget.

In closing, let me ask for everyone's input. The Society is in a phase of re-evaluating its direction and structure. The Society needs to hear from all of you in order to reach a true consensus.

Adlerian Newspaper Columns

NASAP's Public Relations Committee sees an opportunity to spread the Adlerian word through the use of weekly newspaper columns.

Two such columns already exist. Marie Hartwell-Walker and Polly de Sherbinin write a column called "Today's Family." The column is for sale for \$50 for 26 columns. Write Marie at 60 N. Whitney St., Amherst, MA, for samples to show the editor of your local paper.

The other column available is "Coping with Kids" by Linda Albert. This column is supplied free to all 80 Gannett papers around the country by the Gannett News Service, which buys the column from Linda. The local editors determine whether or not to print the column in their city. If you live in a city with a Gannett paper (check the editorial page or call the paper to find out) and if they are not publishing "Coping with Kids" weekly, call the managing editor and tell him/her that you are aware that the Gannett News Service is providing them with "Coping with Kids" and that you would be interested in reading this column weekly. Encourage members of your Parent Study Groups to call also. publishing these columns will not cost your local paper a penny, all that need be shown is sufficient reader interest.

Perhaps you'd like to write a column of your own for your local paper. To do so, study the features format of your paper and write a couple of sample columns that fit under the general features design. Show the samples to the features editor, emphasizing why what you have written would have wide reader appeal. Offer to supply a few columns at no charge, to gauge reader interest. Then have friends write letters to the editor in support of the column when it appears!

Caution: The pay for writing newspaper columns is very poor, but the service you can perform for the very large number of potential readers is tremendous.
