### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

Once again the time has come for the membership of NASAP to select their representatives to the Delegate Assembly. I would like to urge us all to submit nominations. Any person receiving five or more nominations will be put on the ballot for the region in which he/she resides. The election process is as meaningful as we make it.

Our thanks to all of you for your cooperation in renewing memberships so promptly. The prompt response has relieved NASAP's cash flow problem. For those who have not yet sent in your dues for 1981, please do so as soon as possible. Your contributions are tax deductible if you itemize deductions.

In response to the comments of Diane Archer in December's "Letters to the Editor", I agree that The Society needs to address itself to the needs of teachers and parents. Our Society is a delicate balance of many professions, including parents. My feeling is that we need to develop a section for parents and educators (Family Educators) to address the needs of that particular group. Frank Main has submitted ten

names of people willing to start an interest section specializing in Marriage and Family Therapy. I hope there is similar interest in forming a section for parents and teachers. Those who are parents and teachers would know best what NASAP and they need to do to further their growth.

There is a great deal of discussion in the media and medical circles about the need for preventive programs. I know no other school of psychology that has addressed itself to preventive mental health issues as has the psychology of Alfred Adler.

In an attempt to promote recognition of these ideas, letters of introduction and the book MAINTAINING SANITY IN THE CLASSROOM by Rudolph Treikurs have been sent to the Administrator of the National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect and a psychiatrist with the National Institute of Education for Children in Washington, D.C. at the suggestion of Ann Panks. Other suggestions for action are certainly sought and welcomed.





The Delegate Assembly meeting in November in Boise, Idaho saw the beginning of a serious attempt to chart a constructive and energetic course for NASAP as we enter the 1980's. The Ad Hoc "Committee to Plan for the 80's" was established at the annual meeting in June "to study the present status and membership of the Society, to evaluate the needs of its members and to help chart some kind of future course for the 80's to serve as a guideline to the DA in formulating future policies". It has begun its work. A two-hour brainstorming and sharing session with the Delegate Assembly has produced a wide range of concerns for the future of NASAP. Various members have shared additional concerns and made suggestions for changes in program and structure. Now we need your help!

With real spirit of cooperation and social interest, DA members from various regions shared concerns which were prioritized by the entire group. The six major areas of concern (ranked in order of priority) were:

- 1. Are the goals of NASAP clearly understood by all members? Are we a professional, religious, political, social, educational, research and/or lay organization? Are our enengies focused toward these goals?
- 2. How can NASAP and Adlerian Psychology have an impact on psychiatric/psychological circles?
  - 3. How can we survive financially?
- 4. Does NASAP have a plan to provide educational/training programs?
- 5. How can we continually involve the early leaders and founders of NASAP?
- 6. How can we be open to new ideas and integrate them with Adlerian principles?
- 7. Building on our strengths, how can we liberate our potential?
- 8. What can we do to appeal to professionals?
  - 9. Are "sections" a good idea?
- 10. What is the role of an Adlerian "professional" in NASAP?

- ll. Does NASAP's structure adequately fit
  the organization?
- 12. Do we already have our goals defined but lack a commitment to them?
- 13. How can NASAP conferences reach out to potential members?
- 15. Can NASAP survive if lay people run the organization? Can NASAP survive without professionals?
- 16. How can we build a network that communicates successes?
- 17. Should we be a professional organization?
- 18. Are there enough lay people on the Delegate Assembly?
  - 19. Can NASAP survive in North America?

What do you think? How do these concerns strike you? Are some of them relevant? Do you share some of them? Share them with us. Don't keep them to yourself or make a secret of your ideas.

The Code represents 2½ years work of a task force of 20 persons who reviewed codes from all over the country.

### Psychiatry Letter

The November, 1980 issue of American Journal of Psychiatry published a "Letter to the Editor" from Heinz L. Ansbacher. We thought it might be of interest to NASAP members, and it is reprinted below—

SIR: "To Love and to Work," the theme of the 1980 annual meeting, is generally attributed to Freud, but cannot be found in his writings. Rather, it was introduced by Erik Erikson (1) in 1950 as Freud's curt reply to the question, "What should a normal person be able to do well?"

Erikson used the anecdote to counteract the frequent understanding that for Freud the highest human value was "to have good orgasm, with a fitting 'object,'" and that regularly (1). Freud had left himself open to such an understanding through his sexual reductionism, as in the following: "Primitive man...made his work agreeable...by treating it as the equivalent of and substitute for sexual activities (2). Freud influenced psychoanalytic authors such as Feldman to contend that "manual labor ...contains elements of anal sadism and mas-turbation," while intellectual labor contains more "elements of oral masochism and female identification" (3). If Freud said that ultimately "to love and to work" are the essentials of life, he left this casual remark theoretically quite suspended.

In contrast, Adler regarded love and work, together with communal life, as the three major problems of human existence, or life tasks. Mental health depends on the successful solution of these life tasks through social interest expressed in cooperation. "Their solution decides the destiny and the welfare of humanity"
(4). From the 1920's on, Adler stressed this conception of the three life tasks, in slightly varying nomenclature, as being central to his

"To love and to work" has in recent years been cited innumerable times as the quintessence of Freud's wisdom, even becoming the theme of an APA annual meeting. This phenomenon indicates the general trend in psychoanalysis and psychiatry toward humanistic value theory. This welcome development is in fact a movement toward the position Adler had taken as early as 1911. Other Adlerian concepts such as goal striving, the quest for self-esteem, the dialectics of intense ambition and inferiority feelings, and resistance in therapy as an attempt to humiliate the therapist, have increasingly found their way into psychoanalytic writing, while the validity of much of Freud's metapsychology has been questioned. However, this movement toward Adler's position has so far remained largely unrecognized. The proper recognition of Adler would have the practical value of making the training of all mental health professionals more efficient.
