PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Friends:

Our Cleveland Convention was a success from many perspectives. The Cleveland group did a superb job in organizing the programs and the pre and post convention workshops as well as selecting a superb hotel with excellent service and food. The presentations and workshops I was able to attend were of the highest quality.

This month's President's Letter contains the substance of my message to the General Assembly. New members particularly might benefit by an orientation to where NASAP has been and seems to be heading.

NASAP is a constantly changing, developing society. Profound changes occurred in the mid 70's when the membership was opened to anyone without regard to professional education. The American Society of Adlerian Psychology which became NASAP was founded as a professional organization with stringent educational requirements. A great deal of debate took place during ASAP's Board Meetings on whether applicants would be admitted into membership. With the change, the old governing board was modified and expanded to a thirty plus member Delegate Assembly. At first the change seemed overwhelming and many doubted that that large a body could effectively "run the organization". Early Delegate Assembly meetings found us debating for long hours, frustrated with the difficulty of reaching a consensus. When decisions were made they often seemed precipitous and were regretted later. However, from this challenge a committee system developed which deliberated on issues, then brought forth the findings and the motions to the Delegate Assem-It was decided that when controversy surrounded an issue, it would be referred back to Committee for further deliberation and input from as much of the general membership as possible. The process seems to have been successful inasmuch as one of NASAP's founding members, who was visiting the last Delegate Assembly session, stated that he wished a video tape was made of the Delegate Assembly to illustrate how Adlerian ideas could be placed into practice with governing groups. He felt the sessions illustrated mutual respect, problemsolving and social interest at its best.

NASAP seems to be coming to terms with the fact that we are mostly a volunteer organization.

Unlike the Boards of the APA or Mental Health Association, we do not have a large paid staff to carry out our ideas. The Delegate Assembly members have been oriented to the simple fact that if they have an idea, it is not enough to get consensus that their idea is a valid project. It is also crucial for them to personally implement the project to get it done. Accordingly, the Delegate Assembly has expanded its commitment by extending its meeting days to two, devoted to the business of the Society.

This year a President's Advisory Committee composed of past presidents and senior Adlerians was formed to ask for their valued input. One helpful clarification that came from the meeting was simply that the Delegate Assembly as a whole should act like a legislative body with the Executive Committee assuming the duties of the Executive Branch of our Government. In other words, implementing and carrying forth the business of the Society under the guidelines provided by the Delegate Assembly as a whole. This illustrated the necessity to delineate more clearly the lines of responsibility and who is responsible for implementation.

In an attempt to gain perspective on the changes in our Society and to delineate the needs of the membership in the decade to come, the Ad Hoc Committee for the '80's was formed under the Chair of John Symynkywicz. came evident that the membership of NASAP is almost entirely composed of those in the helping professions and thus is, in a sense, a professional organization. However, there is a wide diversity of professional backgrounds. These special interests seemed to fall into four categories; namely, Psychotherapy, Family and Marriage Therapy, Education and Prevention-Parenting. The first two groups have taken steps to form special interest sections. The goals of these sections are 1) to improve the educational aspects of our meetings through input to the Convention Committee; 2) to liaison with other professional societies and licensing bodies with the goal of accrediting as many courses and offerings for Continued Education as possible; 3) to stimulate publication of articles, not only in our own journals, but also in the "mainstream" professional journals that would reach people who do not subscribe to our journals.

To aid NASAP in implementation we have taken steps to broaden our sources of funding. year we have instituted a fund raising drive, and we will make attempts to get matching funds to magnify our efforts. We have begun Alfred Adler Memorial Workshops which have already taken place in four locations, and Bob Powers and Jane Griffith are scheduled for Wilmington, Delaware on October 10th and 11th. The Delegate Assembly is considering plans to have not one but five semi-annual meetings, one in each of the Regions of NASAP. We are also exploring publishing a greater number of books. Raymond Lowe has offered NASAP the copyrights to a manual he has been publishing for years as a contribution to our fund drive.

Those of us at Cleveland left elated and optimistic for the future, feeling that NASAP is on the threshhold of some very important, major developments. This was greatly enhanced by the possibility of grants from the Clonick Estate through $Sydney\ Roth$. A special thanks to him for the encouragement and stimulation he provided this Annual Meeting.

Region V - Northeast

Region V's six Delegate Assembly members scheduled a meeting in Boston on the weekend of June 13 to look at some of their roles and responsibilities as Delegates and their relationship to the parent body, NASAP. We look forward to a report from this meeting, which may serve as a guide to other regional Delegates.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

The Delegate Assembly and its Committees met at the 29th Annual Convention in Cleveland on May 21, 22, 23, 1981. Action items and a few informational items follow for each of the Committees.

Constitution Committee

The Delegate Assembly approved a change in the By-Laws to give the Sub-Committee on Convention/Workshops the status of a Standing Committee.

A By-Law change on elections was referred back to the Constitution Committee.

Convention/Workshop Committee

- 1. The D.A. approved the recommendation that it is up to the host group, in consultation with the Convention/Workshop Committee, to decide whether to hold the convention at a hotel or at a university campus, based on the guidelines of the Convention/Workshop Committee.
- 2. The D.A. approved the recommendation that a local group may hire a knowledgeable person to advise or accomplish the logistical aspects of the convention, subject to the approval of the Convention/Workshop Committee and the Executive Committee of NASAP. (Such person may be either from the local area or from the NASAP Executive).
- $\underline{3.}$ The D.A. approved the recommendation that a geographical description be used in addition to the number for $\underline{\text{regions}}$ at all times. Example: Region I Far West.
- $\frac{4.}{\text{the}}$ The D.A. accepted the invitation to hold the $\frac{1982\ \text{Semi-Annual Meeting in Tucson,}}{\text{fall, dates to be announced.}}$ AZ in

- 5. The Convention/Workshop Committee recommended that the Semi-Annual Meeting as it has been functioning in recent years be discontinued after 1982 and that the D.A. meet in Chicago each November for the sole purpose of conducting NASAP business. In addition, the Regions were to be encouraged to have a meeting once a year for the purpose of education and for considering matters for the Delegates to bring up at NASAP Delegate Assembly meetings. This matter was tabled.
- 6. A request for \$100 for use of the Convention/Workshop Chair for purpose of duplicating materials and contacting sponsoring groups was referred to the Executive Committee.
- 7. Motion that policy decisions regarding the Annual Convention be channeled through the Convention/Workshop Committee and that all correspondence be directed to the Chair of that Committee was referred back to the Convention/Workshop Committee for a report at the Semi-Annual Meeting.

Development Committee

There were no motions from the Development Committee but there were suggestions.

- 1. Membership Drive--suggested that a subcommittee be appointed to deal with this topic and that a more attractive professional looking application be devised.
- $\underline{2}$. There was divided opinion on types of membership: a. retain an open membership with only one classification; or
- b. have categories such as clinical, regular, associate/student, participating with qualifications for each category.
- $\underline{\mathbf{3.}}$ Pilot projects for recruitment of minority membership were suggested.
- $\frac{4.}{to}$ It was suggested that seed money be given $\frac{1}{to}$ local and regional organizations for workshops and that the seed money be repaid and that a percentage of profits be returned to NASAP along with the seed money.
- $\overline{5}$. It was suggested that the Development Committee work with the Convention Committee on the "How to Booklet" for conducting and planning workshops. It was further suggested that a third page be added to the Convention Report to allow for specific suggestions on what went well and what needed improvement.
- $\underline{6}$. Additional information in the Membership $\overline{\text{Di}}$ rectory was suggested to make it more useful. A survey will need to be developed.

Education Committee

- 1. Alfred Adler Memorial Workshop Series—The Committee was encouraged by the reports from the several workshops that were held. More effort will be made to stimulate and publicize the Series. The D.A. approved the recommendation that there be more financial flexibility for local sponsors and agreed to \$300 minimum profit for NASAP instead of the previous \$500.
- 2. The Committee will draft guidelines for the International College so that they may be

discussed at the Semi-Annual Meeting in Ottawa in November.

- Research Bureau--computer programs have been written which will support the Society well into the future. However, the response to the March call for abstracts was met with little enthusiasm. The following actions are being taken:
 - a. Personal letters are being sent to prominent Adlerians.
 - b. Universities are being asked to aid in drafting abstracts for all dissertations and theses on file.
 - c. An announcement will be placed in the JIP requesting abstracts.
- 4. Sections--The Committee strongly encourages special interest sections to consider certification criteria for possible sale and distribution of certified courses. Since the Boise Semi-Annual Meeting, two such groups have formed and could begin this process.
- Guidelines for securing Continuing Education credits for courses and workshops will be made available to interested groups. Information is being sought -- see item elsewhere in this issue.

Public Relations

- 1. There was a brief progress report on the Radio Spots Project funded by the Clonick Estate. The radio spots on study groups were sent to Vancouver, Pocatello, Tucson, St. Louis and Randolph, MA. Not all groups have reported back on results. Master tapes have been copied and are available for sale--see page 6.
- 2. Convention Booth--a banner with "Adlerian Ideas are Everywhere" was completed and used at the APGA booth in St. Louis. The Committee is working on a brochure of the same title. The banner will be available for other groups to use. As funds are available, the committee recommended that booths be set up at the following organization meetings:
 - a. National Council on Family Relations
 - b. Academy of Family Practitioners
 - c. National Association of Social Workers
- Part-time Public Relations Officer--The Committee recommended employing a part-time public relations officer for the Society. This person would be charged with establishing basic public relations procedures that would:
 - a. Increase convention revenues.b. Increase Society membership

 - c. Stimulate an increase in Memorial

Workshops with increased revenues.

d. Increase the use of Adlerian presenters by arranging additional workshop activities for groups which have compatible interests when presenters are already scheduled in certain areas. NASAP would then get a percentage of proceeds from these added activities.

It was agreed that a grant proposal be written to request funds for employing a PR person.

Publications Committee

- 1. Contract with University of Texas Press--A major consideration of this Committee was the contract with the University of Texas Press to publish the two journals in 1982. Guy Manaster and Jon Carlson will remain as editors of the two journals, but they will both be published by the Press. The major item for consideration in the contract was the name change. The D.A. approved a name change last June to Adlerian Psychology Journal, but the Press recommended retaining "Individual" in the name for continuity and less confusion.
- The D.A. approved the following name for the journals for 1982:

Individual Psychology: The Journal of Adlerian Theory, Research and Practice.

- permit the sale of subscription lists, including the NASAP Membership List. The D.A. passed the motion that the sale of the NASAP Membership List must be approved by the Society.
- Advertisements -- It was recommended that advertisements sold by the Press will need approval of the journal executive editor (Manaster), who in turn will consult with and receive approval of the Publications Committee.
- 4. Editorial expenses -- The D.A. approved the recommendation that the two journal editors (Manaster and Carlson) be given \$1,200 each for supplies and operating expenses beginning January, 1982.
- Editorial Board--The Publications Committee approved Dorothy Casper, Len Sperry and Bob Saba for the editorial board for Jon Carlson.

Appreciation was expressed to Guy Manaster for his work on obtaining the contract with the University of Texas Press.

Ad Hoc Committee on the 80's

There was a good deal of discussion with input from D.A. members and other NASAP members at various times during the D.A. meeting and the Convention itself. Reports on discussion will appear in future newsletters. Some interim recommendations were made which are already being put into practice in the D.A. The Interim Recommendations presented were:

- 1. Continue with regional development-strengthen the idea--give direction but don't impose ideas.
 - a. Start with role of D.A. members.
- b. Organize specific committee (Reorganize Development Committee).
- 2. Develop section idea
- a. Call them support groups (ex. psychotherapy support group).
- b. Primary purpose--continuing education within the interest, generating education in others.

- c. Connecting with other organizations in professions.
- d. Create ad hoc committee to oversee this.
- 3. Promotion--marketing of Adlerian ideas plus training.
- a. Support proposal of P.R. Committee regarding P.R. staff person.
- 4. Conventions -- NASAP needs to take the lead.
- a. Conventions must reflect the continental organization.
- b. Need a presentation policy/quality control.

Executive Committee

- The Financial Statement for 1980 was approved. Receipts separate from Clonick Estate and Mosak Bibliography Donations totaled about \$69,000 and expenditures totaled \$65,000. Several items were carried over into 1981 for payment.
- 2. The 1981 Budget, approved in November, was revised to take into account actual balance at the end of the year and 15% was added to office items to allow for rising costs. The Executive Committee approved an addition of \$2,000 to salaries for extra secretarial help for the remainder of the year.
- 3. It was reported that Rex Corman had spent more time than anticipated on the Fund Raising Drive and the \$800 did not cover all his hours. It was agreed to give Mr. Corfman the remaining \$200 from the Roth Foundation's donation for fund raising costs.
- 4. The D.A. approved the Executive Committee recommendation that the check signing resolution be changed from two out of three signatures to one out of three signatures required on checks.

ILLINOIS

AAI of Chicago--A prominent Chicago foundation is formalizing plans for a 1981 Challenge Grant for Institute alumni. Details will follow.

For many years, students who did not live in the Chicago area have been admitted to degree and certificate programs of the Chicago Institute, and have been permitted to complete a substantial portion of their coursework locally. Effective 6/8/81 the Institute has declared a moratorium on new admissions of this kind while it seeks solutions to some of the related difficulties. Institutes in other locations have been asked to provide the Chicago task force with their suggestions. The task force will present its proposals to the faculty at a special meeting in July.

The Oliver Building which houses this institute will also become the home of the Commission on Institutions of Higher Education of the North Central Association, the regional accrediting body. The move is expected in mid-summer.

Takoma Park-The Takoma Park Family Education Center has seen some interesting and challenging times as they work through decision making on objectives as reported in the May newsletter.

The parents have decided to focus on organizing the children's activity room as a top priority and have identified one parent who will staff the office at the elementary school nine hours a week. The elementary school has had federal Head Start follow-through monies, which provided staffing for a parent involvement component at the school. With those monies running out this year, the parents are in the position to operate their own parent involvement program through the F.E.C. with space provided by the school.
