PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow members:

The Executive Committee of NASAP recently met in Chicago. One of the main agenda items was evaluating the proposals for funding by the Clonick Estate.

I believe NASAP owes a debt of gratitude to Sydney Roth for the stimulation of creativity his offer produced. All proposals were forwarded to Sydney. However, three had the endorsement of the Executive Committee.

First, a video-tape series on Active Parent Training by Michael Popkin. Second, a proposal for a challenge grant for next year's fund raising drive. And third, an Adlerian Family Education book by Weltha Logan and several other authors. Several of the other proposals fulfilled the guidelines for funding but it was felt that they needed further refinement and development. Hopefully, they may be funded in the future. Among those were a film about the contribution of Rudolf Dreikurs that Nancy Cannon, Kevin O'Connor and Gerald Cross were suggesting and an application of Adlerian psychology in management and supervision suggested by Richard Royal Kopp.

The proposal guidelines included having an impact for the betterment of humanity and secondly, that funds would be generated and returned to NASAP to fund NASAP projects.

The Executive Committee also reviewed the dues structure and the cost per member for services provided by NASAP. Recommendations will be made to the Delegate Assembly based on our deliberations and findings. In summary, recommendations are to continue the Participating, Family and Student Memberships, eliminate the sliding salary scale and have one membership fee.

There was exciting news that a ten session TV video-tape series on Adlerian principles of

child rearing has been produced in Spanish by Steve Stein in Honduras, Central America. Efforts will be made to bring the video tapes to the California Convention and have them reviewed by Spanish speaking NASAP members at that time.

One of the goals of the Executive Committee is to develop a budget that can be sustained by dues and convention earnings so that additional funds can be used for funding creative projects, which in turn have the potential of returning to NASAP profits and royalties to fund still more projects. Suggested projects that can be started through fund raising and a challenge grant, or other funding,:

- 1) audio visual series demonstrating Adlerian techniques as applied to the family, classroom and clinical situations;
- 2) audio visual materials in foreign languages;
- 3) a parent education newsletter to specifically tie together various parent education efforts throughout the country;
- 4) an historical film on the development of Adlerian Psychology in North America;
- 5) an audio visual production on the use of democratic techniques in various settings;
- 6) development of a public relations project.

Other suggestions are welcome.

I am looking forward to seeing you in Ottawa, which promises to be an exciting meeting. Already 250 people have registered at the time of this writing, three weeks prior to the meeting.

Social Interest Example

Lois Millington of West Vancouver reported that in June, 1981 she set up a "Trust" Fund of \$1,000, the interest of which provides an award to a Grade 12 student at the school where she teaches, King George Secondary. The award this year was \$100.

The award is to be made to a student in financial need demonstrating all-around attributes of service, sportsmanship and scholarship. Should such a candidate also actively promote the preservation and acquisition of lands for public parks, preference will be given to that candidate. The award is to be known as the "Lois Millington Award."

In the preamble to the presentation, Lois credited Alfred Adler and based the preamble on the three main life tasks--Love, Work, Friendship. The gift of the award this year was presented in honor of the people in her life who represent those areas for her: her family, her colleagues around the world and her friends. She hopes to make the presentation each year and share Adler's gifts in this way. Lois said, "As I had been assisted in various ways throughout my education, I thought it would be fitting to 'pass it along,' and who better to honour than Adler!" # # #

International Union of Family Organizations

The International Union of Family Organizations sponsored a conference in Montreal in August with the theme, "On the Role of the Family in the Child's Education." Liliane Bensinger represented NASAP at this conference and set up a special booth with handouts on NASAP and copies of articles pertaining to Parent and Teacher Study Groups. Liliane indicated that this information was most useful in informing the participants at the conference of our work in family and school education.

There were delegates present from Europe, Asia, Africa and North America. Many similar problems in structure and education were expressed regarding all families, according to Liliane. This included single parents, responsibility to a higher authority and evasion of professional responsibility.

Some of the important points where nations differ were stressed. In Africa, the close unity of the large family circle (including distant relatives), before and after marriage, plays an important part in influencing the child's education. Belgium, France and other nations specialize in organized surveys regarding the needs of the people; such as, maternity leave, day care centers, etc. They then establish organizations according to the needs. In Spain, there is an attempt to enforce strict discipline with the youth. However, the problems of delinquency have not been reduced.

The conference started with an Open Forum, where each nation presented its concerns and hopes and suggested ways for finding solutions to the existing problems. The group then separated into three workshops on Housing, Education, and Family Movement. Each individual chose the specific workshop of interest and gave recommendations regarding possible solutions.

Lilian reports that our recommendations on cooperation and democratic problem solving with teachers, parents and counselors and the young human being were very favorably received.
