#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

1982 is the year of the Fifteenth International Congress of Individual Psychology to be held in Vienna, Austria on August 2-6, 1982. It is organized by the Austrian Individual Psychology Association whose president is Professor Doctor Walter Spiel. This year the Congress is deviating from the usual practice of organizing a Congress limited to Adlerian psychologists. Their goal is to bring about an encounter of Individual Psychologists with representatives of other therapeutic methods. The hope is to work out differences and to confirm similarities with other schools. The hope is that such an encounter can lead to a better understanding of Individual Psychology, other methods, and to open future prospects for the further development of psychotherapy.

Prominent researchers and therapists such as Victor Frankl, Rudolph Ekstein, Michael Mahoney, Erwin Ringle, Walter Spiel, Bernard Shulman, Rhinehart Tausch and Michael Titze, have already agreed to give main lectures and to participate in the plenary discussion to be held at the end of the Congress.

The Congress is the official meeting of the International Association of Individual Psychology and is held every three years. Unlike NASAP, which is a society of individual members, the IAIP is a society of member organizations. The North American Society of Adlerian Psychology is a member.

As has been the practice in the past, this year's ICASSI will also be held in conjunction, two weeks prior to the Congress, from July 8 to 31 at Badgastein, Austria, a famous health spa and resort near Salzburg. It will present a comprehensive program which includes the philosophy and theory of Adlerian Psychology, and a variety of courses, workshops and practice, designed to expand professional and personal

This is an opportunity to meet Adlerians from around the world and to visit Europe. We hope to see many of our friends in Vienna this

It occurred to me that NASAP offers a number of services and materials that have never been catalogued and that there is a strong possibility the majority of the membership does not know what is available. For this reason, I asked Neva Hefner to collaborate in compiling the following information. I have also suggested that the Newsletter carry a column on a regular basis listing what is available, from whom and under what conditions.

#### Death & Dying Audio Cassettes

Steven P. Lindenberg, counselor in private practice in Hershey, PA, has written and produced four audio cassettes on the subject of death and dying.

Hey Mark! The Fox is Dead!, a dialogue between three teenagers illustrating the effects of the sudden, accidental death of a classmate on his or her peers.

"Puff! Wake Up!": A Child's View of Death, Grief and Bereavement makes use of a family situation in which a pet cat dies to illustrate a child's view of death, grief and bereavement.

"But Mr. Wilson...Why Did it Have to Be Melissa?" takes place in a senior high school. It was developed to help persons in mid to late adolescent stage of development to understand dynamics of death and dying through the example of the death of a peer.

Deep Muscle Relaxation with Guided Meditation incorporates the techniques of progressive, deep muscle relaxation with guided meditation for those cases involving acute and chronic stress.
