NASAP member, Helen R. Ellis, reports on her visit to the Freud Museum in Vienna where Freud's mementoes reveal his misunderstandings and feelings of rivalry toward Adler:

(written by Freud in 1911 to...?)
"...I have taken over the Presidency
of the Vienna Group again after Adler's
and Stekel's resignations. Adler's
behavior was no longer reconcilable
with our psychoanalytic interest, he
denies the importance of the libido and
traces everything to aggression. The
damaging effects of his publications
will not take long to make themselves
felt."

(written by Freud to Karl Abrahan, March 3,1911)
"He (Adler) has created for himself
a universal system without Love, and
I will execute on him the revenge of
the offended goddess."

Adlerians Make Headlines...

Oscar Christensen

Mary Caldwell, NASAP member from Ohio, shared an Associated Press article that appeared in Cleveland's The Plain Pealen. Under the title of "Parents confused, counselor says," the Press reported on Oscar Christensen's October 23 talk to the American Academy of Pediatrics in New York.

The excerpts printed by the Press indicated that parents' confusion arises out of the changing social relationships that have encouraged children to believe they are equal to their parents. Most of the article dealt with the problems that arise between parents raised in an autocratic society and children who see themselves as social equals. The concluding suggestion quoted from Christensen was to offer the child a choice instead of laying down orders; the child is then faced with living with that choice.

Mitchel Messer, Chicago

The entire front page of the "Living" section of the Chicago Sun-Times recently featured Mitchell Messer and his anger workshops. The reporter attended one of the five-hour anger clinics Messer has been conducting throughout the midwest and summarized that experience. Included were the four basic goals of a person's negative behavior ("mischief"); managing anger rather than suppressing it; and learning how to avoid becoming victims of another person's anger.

Mitch Messer will be featured on the Phil Donahue show on January 7, 1983. (Robert L. Powers and Lynn Lott have been previous guests on that program.)

Once again, Lew identifies his source of information (Adler) in his first statements. "The music in this book, like the music in our lives, flowed from the orchestrated efforts of many people. The lyrics were primarily influenced by the writings of Alfred Adler, the psychiatrist of common sense..."
