

Giving Credit Where Credit is Due

Cincinnati, Ohio April 4, 1983

Over the last month I have become increasingly aware of published columns in which child rearing techniques are taken directly from the work of Rudolf Dreikurs, M.D., noted author and child psychiatrist. These ideas on the goals of children's misbehavior and democratic versus authoritarian child rearing techniques are taken directly from his book, Children: The Challenge, published in 1964.

This theory and technique of child rearing has also been published in numerous Adlerian Journals and has been the subject of other books and manuals on child rearing techniques, most notably The Systematic Training for Effective Parenting program authored by Don Dinkmeyer, Ph.D.

Are the authors of these columns and the editors of these publications aware of the source of this material? Why haven't the proper Adlerian authors been given credit for their work? As a psychologist engaged in private practice with many parents and children who need these techniques and methods, I am quite

happy to see them published in nationally syndicated columns. However, it distresses me greatly to see the work of my teachers in public print without any credit, reference or acknowledgment given to them. Moreover, I believe that by not noting references to the public they are proving a disservice. It is important for the people to know where the principles and the methods in these articles can be learned. For example, there are many family education centers throughout the cities of North America where these techniques are actively being taught to parents and families, and where readers interested in pursuing the ideas in those columns can go for further information, study and practice.

I would like to see these types of columns continued. I only ask that in the future appropriate credit and appropriate information to the readers be given so that they can follow up, in their own lives, on the very pertinent information in these columns.
