The New Hypnotherapies and Individual Psychology

Recently, a number of exciting hypnotherapeutic methods and strategies have been "unveiled". Even though Adlerians have shown little interest in hypnosis, I believe these methods are worthy of serious consideration by Adlerians.

Adler seemed to be somewhat wary of hypnosis, noting that it was only effective to the extent to which the therapist communicated encouragement (Adler 1956, p.434). Adler's view is understandable given the way in which hypnosis was commonly understood and practiced at the turn of the century. Ellenberger (1970) carefully details the rise and fall of Traditional hypnosis and its relationship to dynamic psychotherapy. He describes two opposing views of behavior and mind: Romanticism and Enlightenment.

Emanating from Romanticism and the related philosophies of Schopenhauer and Social Darwinism was the belief that healing involved the mobilization of irrational forces. This was exemplified in the Paris or Salpetriere School of Hypnosis of Charcot, Janet and, later in the psychoanalytic formulation of Freud. Emanating from the Enlightenment tradition, and related philosophies of Kant, Liebnitz and socialist thought was the belief that healing involved rational thought and education. This was exemplified in the Nancy School of Hypnosis of Bernheim, Liebault and Coue', and in Adler's and Existential formulations. Generally speaking the Salpetriere School -the Traditionalists - was the dominant mode of hypnosis during Adler's

Were Adler alive today, I believe he would find considerable kinship with the "New" Nancy School with their emphasis on growth, self-responsibility and self-hypnosis, and clinician-patient collaboration, in counterdistinction to the emphasis on pathology, hypnotizability, and clinician skill and authority of the Traditionalists. Proponents of the "New" Nancy School are called Naturalistic (Erickson and Rossi, 1981), Experiential (Barber, 1981), or the New Hypnosis (Aroaz, 1985).

I find the New Hypnotherapies are very compatible with the theory of Individual Psychology. In both, a premium is placed on respect, cooperation and collaboration between clinician and client, and, a focus on patient strengths, growth, and education are common. Self-hypnosis is considered the basis of the "new" approach. So also, is an emphasis on tailoring treatment to the needs and styles of the patient. Erickson elegantly states this:

"Each patient is an individual. Hence, psychotherapy should be formulated to meet the uniqueness of the individual's needs rather than tailoring the person to fit the Procrustean bed of a hypothetical theory of human behavior" (1979).

There are, then, obvious connections between Individual Psychology and the New Hypnotherapies. The techniques and strategies developed by these colleagues are innovative and potent. I recommend them for your consideration.

AAI-Chicago Receives \$100,000 Bequest

A woman who studied with Rudolf Dreikurs has left the Adler Institute of Chicago 80% of her estate, according to AAI-C President Randall Thompson. It is estimated the donation will be nearly \$100,000, the largest single donation to the Adler Institute.

Claudine Bock of St. Louis, who studied at AAI-C and in Corvallis and Eugene, Oregon, had no stipulations on the bequest. It has been earmarked for the Institute's Endowment Fund, which was recently cited as lacking in a recent reaccreditation study.

"It will certainly help us in our long-range planning efforts" said Thompson. "However, we must firmly resist the temptation to think of this bequest as cash on hand. In truth, we are just catching up [on endowment] to where we should have been."

The Institute has recently announced an "\$89 in '89" Annual Fund Drive, planning to raise \$89,000 this year. The Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago is the largest degree-granting, accredited Adlerian Institute in North America.

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AAI-Ft. Wayne Affiliates with College

The Alfred Adler Institute of Ft. Wayne has affiliated with the Lutheran College of Health Professions.

The Institute now has access to new classrooms, administrative assistance, and housing for out of town students. Rooms, on a space available basis, will be \$20 per night.

AAI-Ft. Wayne has resumed a full schedule of courses leading to certification or the master's and Psy.D. doctoral program from the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago.

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South Carolina Conference Draws 189

The sixth annual South Carolina Conference on Adlerian Psychology drew 189 registrants, up 30% from the previous year. Almost one-third of the participants were from North Carolina, and six other states were represented.

At the Conference, the first annual Arliss J. Epps Social Interest Award was given posthumously to Mr. Epps, reflecting his outstanding contributions to the organization.

The organization changed its name from the Columbia (SC) Adlerian Society to the more encompassing South Carolina Society of Adlerian Psychology (SCSAP) at a membership meeting during the summer. It will more accurately reflect the state-wide nature of the membership and activities.

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AAI-Chicago Psy.D. Approved by Illinois

The Illinois Department of Professional Regulation has approved the Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D.) program of the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago.

According to Mark Stone, Dean of Faculty, approval means graduates can sit for the state psychology license examination after their post-doctoral year. Application for the same approval has been made with the state of Indiana, where a substantial program has been affiliated with the Adler Institute of Ft. Wayne.

Accreditation by the American Psychological Association is being pursued. According to Stone, that cannot occur until the first group of doctoral students has graduated. AAI-C enrolled 24 students in the Psy.D. program in Fall, 1987, and there are now 59 in the program.
