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Contemporary Family Therapy and IP

Truly wise and open-minded mental health professionals agree that Adlerian formulations and methods have significantly influenced both the vocabulary and clinical practice of individual psychotherapy. As Joseph Wilder noted: "The proper question is not whether one is Adlerian, but how much of an Adlerian one is."

This attribution has not been accorded to Adlerian Family therapy. Even among the most open-minded Family Therapy writers and practitioners, there is little awareness or appreciation of the legacy of the Adlerian approach to families except for an occasional mention of Adlerian Family Counseling and Family Education Centers. Only one textbook (1) surveying family therapy approaches profiled Adlerian thought, and the chapter was primarily about Family Counseling.

Two recent publications hold some promise in clarifying and reversing some unfortunate misconceptions about Adlerian Family Therapy. A special issue of Individual Psychology on Family Therapy (2) contained articles written by practitioners/adherents of nine prominent contemporary orientations to Family Therapy. The concluding article compared and contrasted these nine orientations with the Adlerian approach.

Robert Sherman and Don Dinkmeyer, Sr. have edited a book Systems of Family Therapy: An Adlerian Integration (3) which Alan S. Gurman, Ph.D. noted is "the first book that really connects Adlerian thinking with contemporary systemic thinking." He called the book a very significant contribution to Family Therapy.

Don-David Lusterman, Ph.D. correctly asserts that the book is "must" reading for family therapists because of "its clear exposition of Adlerian theory and technique -- a terra incognita for many structurally and strategically trained therapists -- but also in its thought provoking chapters comparing and contrasting the Adlerian approach to other major schools.'

Sherman and Dinkmeyer begin their book with the assumption that the Adlerian Family Therapy approach encompasses the concerns expressed in contemporary theories of family therapy. They then carefully and systematically articulate how the theories and methods of other family approaches are comparatively accounted for or synthesized within Adlerian theory. They note that Adlerian theory "possess several critical properties of inclusiveness that give it enormous capability to integrate a great deal from other theories." (p.88) Because of this inclusiveness they contend that Adlerian theory can be classified as a systems theory, a developmental theory, an interactional theory, a behavioral theory, a cognitive theory, a structural theory, a strategic theory, a object relations theory, a multigenerational theory, an experienced theory and a metacommunications approach.

Seminal contributions by Jim Bitter, Bill McKelvie, Don Kelly, Steve Hirschorn, and Jim Croake elaborate the interdigitation of Adlerian thinking with the communications (Sater), interactive (MRI), Strategic, Structural, and cognitive (Rational Emotive) approaches to Family Therapy. Each of these contributors are skilled practioners of both Adlerian and the major theory they describe. Looking through the eyes of the Adlerian approach, they guide the reader to examine these five orientations in a new light.

Sherman and Dinkmeyer deduced 66 concepts and change methods from the six approaches studied. Not surprisingly, the Adlerian approach had the greatest degree of overlap with the other five approaches (92%), thus, supporting the authors' proposition that the Adlerian approach is truly inclusive and integrative. As reviewers outside the Adlerian fold have noted, this book is a landmark contribution to the field of family therapy. The book has great heuristic value, and as such it demands careful study, discussion and debate. To date, it represents the most sophisticated rendering of the Adlerian model, not just to family applications, but, also by implication, also to individual psychotherapy.

--CONTEMPORARY FAMILY THERAPY AND IP--(from page 1)

Like the evolution and development of individual psychotherapy, family therapy has passed through an evangelical period. In the infantile phase of this period, each new family approach claimed it transcended the mistakes and shortcomings of other approaches. Proselytizing of converts to the new approach occurred first in workshops and independent training institutes before being legitimized in university training programs.

In the adolescent phase of this period, hero worship of the approaches' gurus continued, but difficulties applying the approach created identity diffusion and even rebellion among some of the true believers. They, in turn, continued their search for another true approach, or began the hard work of reconciling and integrating concepts and techniques from existing family approaches. As this evangelical era in family therapy is ending, so is the expectation that therapists religiously adhere to a particular approach or system.

Today, the quest for a truly integrative approach has become the "Holy Grail" among family theorists and therapists. This is a most interesting paradox. If we are to believe Sherman and Dinkmeyer -- and for that matter the two prominent non-Adlerians who reviewed the book -- there is no need to look further.

Their message is clear: the Adlerian Model is the integrative model! But like the proverbial "voice in the wilderness", who is there to hear the message? A look through the last five years of convention programs for APA, AACD, and AAMFT show few, if any, presentations on the Adlerian Family Model. Except for the forum at the 1987 NASAP Convention in which the five contributors to Sherman and Dinkmeyer book highlighted their integrative model, there appears to be little indication that few have heard the good news.

Since there is no apparent surplus of truly wise and open-minded mental health professionals today, I wonder how long it will be before it can be said: "the question is not whether one is an Adlerian family therapist, but how much."

For example, one episode features a spoiled boy, new in town, who tells Opie how to manipulate Andy to get his way. As the episode unfolds Opie tries a whole catalog of misbehavior, none of which is successful.

At one point Opie lay on the floor of Andy's office kicking and screaming. When Andy looks up from his desk to inquire what he is doing, Opie responds, "Having a tantrum." "Oh," is Andy's response as he goes about his business.

The show is done with humor, and sensitivity. I commend it to my colleagues as a fun and effective way of presenting Adlerian principles.

While the heart and soul of our organization has always been our "voluntary" commitment to Adlerian principles and practices, as a maturing organization I believe we should modernize this old practice. It is simply enough to ask the private practioner to take time away from his/her shop, or the agency clinician to use vacation days, in order to attend board meetings. In essence, I fear the policy precludes us from accessing creative leadership because one cannot afford the involvement.

With all due respect, I hope the Delegate Assembly will give thoughtful consideration to this matter.
