# AAI-C Opens New Gender/Cultural Center

The new Adler Center for Gender and Cultural Studies will feel right at home at the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago, according to Marilyn Marks-Frey, Ph.D., Director.
"Adlerian Psychology is appropriate for dealing with culture and gender issues based on principles of social responsibility and social interest. Adlerians clearly feel the necessity of modifying their work to incorporate the diversity that exists in our present society." Individual Psychology, she noted, "emphasizes the uniqueness of each person and environmental factors that influence development and pathology."

Beginning full operations this fall, the new Center aims to incorporate awareness of gender and cultural differences into the therapeutic process. "To me this orientation is critical and has been ignored by the psychological field for too long, " said Dr. Marks-Frey. "Teaching a course or two is not enough."

"I feel it important to educate students and professionals to the difference in the experience of being female vs male, and of diverse sexual orientation. Additionally it is imperative that clinicians are aware of the different experience that minority persons have in our society. How institutional racism effects self esteem has to be incorporated into one's education. Helping students to see that what is pathology in their cultural/class value system may not be pathology in a diverse culture/class."

The Center plans to expose persons to gender/cultural diversity through both formal and informal means: conducting monthly seminars with presentations by experienced persons; facilitating and promoting research; developing curriculum courses; providing AAIC students with supervised practicum experience; developing educational options that encourage women and minorities academically; providing role modeling; as well as informal brainstorming and exploring related art and music. "I feel that this Center will serve as a 'spring board' for change in the field," she

## What "Causes" Borderline Personalities?

Len Sperry gives an excellent brief description of the borderline personality in the June-July 1991 issues of the NASAP Newsletter, but he too cavalierly says that "The borderline personality appears to be an increasing diagnostic entity brought about by the marked social changes in family instability over the past three decades as well as abuse and other traumas in childhood." He also states "This individual often has a history of childhood abuse and trauma in which the mother is often absent, neglectful or in other ways emotionally unavailable or unpredictable. As a result, the child does not develop a secure sense of the mother as a good and caring figure."

It is highly probable that borderline personalities indeed are frequently abused and traumatized in their childhood and that they often have mothers (and fathers) who are absent, neglectful or in other ways emotionally unavailable or unpredictable. But I have seen literally hundreds of them over the past forty years who were reared by devoted and emotionally available and predictable mothers (and fathers) and who were not abused nor traumatized during their childhood. My experience, as well as much other clinical and research data, tends to show that most borderline personalities are born with a very strong tendency to "split", to have difficulty tolerating both negative and positive feelings simultaneously for the same person, to see others as all good or all bad, and to have other important disturbances that Sperry nicely describes.

Object relations theory, spawned of psychoanalytic overemphasizes on early environmental influences, and neglectful of innate biological vulnerabilities of borderline individuals, is followed too closely by Sperry and had better be skeptically viewed and assessed by Adlerians.

# The Neurotic Personalities of Our Time:

### The Narcissistic Personality

In part I (Sperry, 1991) the borderline personality was described. Along with the borderline personality the narcissistic personality is clearly a "neurotic personality of our times". The "me" generations' values of immediate gratification and self-aggrandizement are syntonic with the narcissistic personality. Because of self-absorption they have difficulty showing empathy towards others and as a result have

significant problems in an interpersonal relationship. Recently, this personality pattern has become relatively common in our culture which touts such slogans as "have it your way", "you can have it all", "looking out for number one", and the like. As such, the narcissistic personality reflects our current societal norms and values.

### Subtypes and Dynamics

Typically, narcissists uses other persons to indulge their desires. They are described as manifesting an unrealistic sense of self-importance, exhibitionistic attention-seeking, inability to take criticism, and interpersonal manipulation. They live lives of grandly assumed "entitlement" believing that what others do for them is only what they deserve and what they are entitled to. The personal integrity and rights of others are disregarded while at the same time special favors are expected, assumed or demanded of themselves. Classic narcissistic personalities defend against underlying vulnerability through devaluation and boastfulness, and correspond to the current DSM-III-R criteria of narcissistic personality disorder.

In addition to this grandiose personality pattern, there is another subtype of the narcissistic personality. It has been labelled the "closet narcissist" by Masterson and the "narcissistically combined type" by Kohut. This subtype is characterized by vulnerability and hypersensitivity vulnerable with grandiose features. These individuals are more likely to defend against omnipotent and grandiose feelings by projecting them on others, viz, idealization. Actually, this subtype may be more common than the grandiose subtype. They tend to be quiet and passive and hide behind a facade of compliance or shyness.

How do these narcissistic personality subtypes develop? As children, they were probably viewed by others as special in terms of looks, talent, of "promise". They were probably keenly sensitized to interpersonal cues. Psychologically, narcissistic personalities tends to view themselves as: "I'm special and unique and so I'm entitles to extraordinary rights and privileges which I don't have to earn" (grandiose type) or, "I'm entitles, special, but shy and reserved" (vulnerable type). Similarly they view life as: "Life is a banquet table to be sampled at will. People owe me admiration and privilege" (both types). Consequently, their life strategy becomes: "Therefore I'll expect and demand specialness even though I may not have earned it (grandiose type); or, "I'll be passive and compliant and just expect others to read my mind and meet my needs" (vulnerable type)." As children, special indulgence and overvaluation characterize their relationship with their parents. Their parental injunction probably was: "Grow up and be wonderful, for me." Often narcissists are only children and have learned exploitive and manipulative behaviors from their parents.

behaviors than the narcissist.

Additional discussion of the concept of narcissism, its dynamic and treatment can be found in Sperry and Ansbacher (in press). In a classic publication, Ansbacher, (1985) describes the psychoanalytic development of the concept of narcissism, in part, as Freud's reaction to Adler's critique of infantile sexuality. Ansbacher then shows how the current criteria for the narcissistic personality disorder matches Adler's characterization of the neurosis.

life with a sense of social interest and social responsibility."

Beginning her education with a bachelor's degree in Sociology and Cultural Anthropology, Dr. Marks-Frey has focused her career on gender and cultural issues. "In the 60's I taught college in a predominantly African American and Hispanic community. It seemed ludicrous to teach theories that were developed on Caucasian middle class males to this population. So using sociology and history books, I modified theories to apply to the population with which I was working."

"Non-sexist child raising was another one of my interests. Raising children to have choices rather than to incorporate what society said they 'should be' simply because they were male or female was not something that I could morally teach. Additionally, I believe that being lesbian/gay is a person's right and that psychologists must view this as a life style equal in acceptability to being heterosexual."

In the Center participants will be addressing issues related to women's issues, men's issues, lesbian/gay issues and issues of cultural diversity which includes culture, class, religious and ethnic differences. There also will be a combining of gender issues with cultural issues -- "For example, the experience of being an Hispanic lesbian is not the same as being a Caucasian lesbian," she noted.

---Neurotic Personalities of Our Time: Common Features (Continued from page 3)

In returning to the theme of "neurotic personalities of our time" in Part I, (Sperry, 1991), it has been observed that both narcissistic and borderline personalities share sufficient commonalities, and thus may be confused diagnostically. Both gravitate toward opposing stances: dependency and vulnerability vs. independence and superficiality for the narcissistic subtypes, and distancing vs. clinging for the borderline. This parallel may be noted in the diagnostic overlap that is observed with narcissistic and borderline disorders. Brief shifts from one pole to the other are noted in both disorders and can be diagnostically confusing. However, while the narcissistic stays in one position for extended periods of time, the borderline is likely to vacillate frequently and rapidly between clinging and distancing. Furthermore, the borderline tends to resort to more impulsive and dramatic (Continued on page 6)
