Report from Riga

I flew into Riga on Hamburg Air, a Boeing 300 prop jet. Only Russian planes at the airport. Had to go through two security checks and get a temporary visa. I was met by Victor Ozolinsh and Janis Gulbis, M.P. (These men had attended ICASSI Ireland on scholarships.) Janis had a car and government driver. We went to the Hotel Riga. Started a sumptuous supper at 7 p.m. and ended at 9 p.m. One thing the Latvians can do well: cook and enjoy eating. The menu was in German, Russian, Latvian and English.

This hotel is packed with foreign business men. There is a woman in charge of each floor and you have to turn in your key when you leave the room. This is good security, but not good enough. Two days after I arrived, police lined the lobby and would not let any locals in unless I verified they were my friends. People with hard currency are fine targets for thieves, e.g., the American Ambassador was robbed while presenting his credentials. Latvians are still using the ruble but will soon print their own money. There is a currency store in the hotel where one can buy goods with dollars that the Latvians cannot buy with rubles.

Yeltsin has said he will take over the Baltic Army but has not done so. The 300,000 Russian soldiers here are a big problem and potential threat. No one wants them at home and no one wants them here. Latvians had promised to feed them in return for oil and gas. The Russians broke the agreement and have cut off the oil and gas supplies. Latvians have little hard currency to buy elsewhere. There will be hard times in Spring when they cannot run the tractors.

All streets to Parliament are blocked by huge boulders to stop Russian tanks. Every day when I walked to the lecture hall I passed fresh flowers marking the place where they had killed seven young Latvians. When the Black Berets attacked the police station, farmers drove tractors into the streets, trucks, wagons, anything to block the Russians. They cannot do that now,

Certificate of Study Announced

NASAP has developed a process to identify and acknowledge those individuals who have completed a course of study in Individual Psychology. Those meeting the criteria for a Certificate of Study may receive a designation of their study received at NASAP conventions, workshops and regional meetings.

The Certificate of Study does not replace or supplant requirements for certification or licensure as may be regulated by state or provincial authorities, nor can it serve as an endorsement of individual skills or abilities. It does acknowledge systematic study of Adlerian Psychology and identifies those individuals who have such interests and education.

Requirements for a Certificate of Study:

- A. 90 documented hours of convention attendance
- B. Completion of workshops in 3 of 5 core areas of study: 1. General Principles of Adlerian Psychology 2. Family Counseling 3. Parent Education 4. School Applications 5. Psychotherapy
- C. Completion of a workshop, or the equivalent, in general principles of Adlerian Psychology. This requirement may be met through a formal academic course of study at a regionally accredited college or university or through a workshop offered by individuals or organizations other than NASAP. Sufficiency of study will be evaluated on an individual basis.
 - D. Current NASAP membership
 - E. Continuous NASAP membership during certification period
 - F. Submitted study must be completed within five (5) years of the application
- G. Special consideration will be given to those who have completed study prior to the establishment of standards for certification, and requirements may be waived on an individual basis for such prior study upon application to NASAP.

There is a fee of \$100 for the application, review and certificate. This fee is non-refundable, but a \$50 credit will be made towards resubmission within three (3) years if the certificate is not awarded.

Applications and further information will be available at the convention in Chicago.

In the past several years I have been able to contribute in many ways to the organization professionally. Now I have found a way to continue to contribute after I am gone--not just from the DA, but from this earth. I was reviewing my Will recently and decided to include NASAP as a beneficiary.

This is exceedingly easy to do: I merely designated that a percentage of my estate should go to NASAP. I could have just as easily designated a specific dollar amount, or that the remainder of my estate after other bequests are satisfied should go to NASAP.

This is not a new idea; the Clonick Estate was very generous to NASAP; it helped us establish an endowment which has been crucial to our financial stability. Carol Arnold's bequest, for example, has been used to help spread Adlerian ideas.

hence the boulders. Tension is high and there is much fear of the future. But the Latts are a very persistent and courageous people.

One half the population, one and a half million people live in Riga. Electric streetcars are jammed like sardine cans. There are only 27 private stores in the city. The government stores are jammed with wall-to-wall people when they have any goods. People stand in line all day just to buy something. Retirees hire themselves out as queue standers. The waiters in the hotel are old line communists that bribed their way into their jobs. It is O.K. to bribe people but not to tip them. Tipping is capitalistic.

They dislike me because I am being provided for by the government and from their point of view, a Nationalist is a Capitalist. This does not prevent them from hustling, however. They kept trying to sell me caviar for \$10 a can that I could buy in the currency store for \$3. Anyone who does anything for himself is considered to be a bourgeois reactionary. The waiters believe the government is run by crooks. The maids did my laundry and I practically had to fight them to give them money for doing so. They finally realized that I was a stupid American and so took the money in order not to hurt my feelings. Many things are upside down. The entire economy is Japan on its head, and the government is America upside down. Even the door handles turn in the opposite direction.

The Lectures

It turns out my lectures will be in the City Hall, a former Communist headquarters. I let the audience vote on how long I should talk and they chose the maximum: three hours. So I will lecture three hours a day every day. Translators are provided for me. Large crowds fill the room...250-300 people and some standing in the halls. After the first speech people just sat silent. I thought maybe I had not done well. Several days later, I was told that Latvians do not applaud after lectures. If they get up and leave at once, you have not done so well. If they sit and meditate on what you have said, that is the highest compliment. So, I was being complimented and did not know it.

Friday night a couple of Latvian psychologists came to visit me. I got the guards to let them in. They drank all of my American bourbon and were direct and blunt with me. I realized that they had totally missed the point of some of my examples. They interpret everything in an exonomic sense, no matter what the point of the story is.

I realize that some of my examples simply do not make sense to them, e.g. they don't know what a parking lit is since they have never seen one. Nor have they much idea of the outside world. All newspapers were published in one building so the government could keep strict control over the content.


They did not know of Chernoble until the Swedes detected radiation two weeks later. Then the Russians came in and forced Latvians to go there and work on the clean up. The newspapers ran stories about the heroic Latvian "volunteers" who had come to help Mother Russia! They have no idea how much radiation is present in their country. I had offered to start a scholarship fund with the money the University will pay me for the lectures. My friends told me I was a fool. That whatever they paid me (it turned out to be 895 rubles) would only buy about two beers in Berlin. That one professor makes about \$14 a month. They cannot buy train, plane tickets except with hard currency.

The People

Hence, a people who had been slaves for over fifty years are now prisoners of their economic system. I realized that the bourbon they had drunk was more than one man's month's salary. I was deeply shaken. I cried. We parted friends. I felt like a spoiled child who had been talking to abused adults. I finally found a place to exchange money and stood in the long line. I got over 3,300 rubles for my twenty dollar bill. I bought some dolls for 28 rubles apiece. I bought twenty postcards and stamps to mail them for three rubles...about a penny and a half. It is like monopoly money. I feel as if I am stealing, things are so cheap. The best meal in the hotel is less than a dollar in U.S. money.

It would take years for a person to save enough money to go to Holland and once there, they could not pay ICASSI tuition nor room and board. My plane ticket here from Berlin is about the equivalent of four year's salary for my friend, Viesturs. At first, I felt as if I were in an Ingmar Bergman movie...everything was grey and a bit mysterious. Now I see the reality of the situation. I see the results of rigid ideology: destroy, destroy, destroy.

In Part II of Dr. Linden's story, he speaks with the Mayor of Riga, the Minister of Culture, and begins the effort to start an Adlerian group.
