Delegate Assembly

Action items from the Chicago Delegate Assembly meeting include:

Associate Membership will be continued for another two years to get a 3-year picture for an evaluation.

Approved a 5-year term for Newsletter Editor and procedures for appointment of an Editor.

Approved four options for cost containment of Newsletter to be implemented in 1993.

Implementation of a Certificate of Attendance in the Study of Adlerian Psychology was approved.

A summer training program for counselors to enhance skills and develop knowledge of Adlerian theory and practice was approved for summer of 1993 in Vancouver.

Agreed to continue the convention format of 2 1/2 hour, 90 and 60 minute presentations, and round table sessions at the Toronto convention unless there is strong negative feedback in convention evaluation forms.

Applications for hosting the annual convention are to be submitted by May I, three years prior to the convention date.

Accepted invitation to San Diego for 1994 convention.

Applications for 1995 convention will be considered at November D.A. meeting.

Approved request by Business and Organization Section for pre-convention workshops for business professionals in conjunction with the 1994 convention and, if possible, the 1993 convention.

Betty and Cam, Edith and Milton

Adlerian psychology as a successful way of living is reflected in the marriages of two NASAP couples, Milton and Edith Dewey and Cameron and Betty Meredith, who are celebrating their 60th and 52nd wedding anniversaries this year. Both couples credit Adlerian psychology as being instrumental in their successful relationships and raising their families, as well as their careers.

Dr. Rudolf Dreikurs was responsible for bringing both couples into the realm of the Adlerian approach to life over 40 years ago. Edith Dewey said she first heard Dr. Dreikurs when she asked him to speak at a Unitarian Regional Conference in 1951. "He introduced us to understanding children's misbehavior by recognizing their goals," commented Edith. "Many of us were intrigued as was I."

Cameron Meredith said his introduction to Dr. Dreikurs occurred in 1950 when he visited the Community Child Guidance Center at Heven Junior High School in Evanston, IL., at the suggestion of colleague Ray Lowe. "It changed my life. I participated as a group member and co-counselor almost every Saturday for six

Both couples' involvement with Adlerian psychology led to active participation in launching local organizations. While a resident in Wilmington, DE, Edith founded the Associates for Study and Action, now the Family Education Center of Delaware. She served as president until Milton was transferred to Toronto where they both started the Toronto Association of Individual Psychology. Milton was president and Edith started the group's Family Education Center. Later, Edith became the first Dean of the Alfred Adler Institute of Toronto.

The Midwest Society of Individual Psychology in St. Louis was initiated in the early 60's by Cameron, Manford Sonstegard and Raymond Trover. Still active, MSIP has about 100 members who provide parent study groups for the area. "Betty and I have served on the Board/for many years," Cameron said.

"We were on the Board when MSIP sponsored the annual convention of NASAP in

St. Louis in 1968." The Merediths also organized the Alfred Adler Institute of St. Louis which is currently inactive. Today Betty and Cameron have their own private practice and Cameron often teaches at the Adler School of Professional Psychology in Chicago.

On a personal level, both couples claim Adlerian principles have played a major role in raising their children. "We practiced principles of Adlerian psychology in our family and Milton and I led parent study groups together," said Edith. "I was able to change my relationship with our son and we became good friends before he was killed at the age of 28. Before Adlerian psychology, he won our frequent power contests," she explained.

"Adlerian psychology was very helpful in creating humanistic relationships in our family and in conflict resolution," noted Cameron. "Principles and practices of encouragement were very useful. We have had a 'conferative' and partnership relationship." Cameron said Betty "went back to college after almost 25 years as a great mother, wife and homemaker and earned her M.A. in counseling in 1950 and used IP as a school counselor and in our private practice."

Edith feels her greatest contribution to Adlerian psychology was authoring Basic Applications of Adlerian Psychology. "I have met many people at NASAP who say it got them through a course and many reports from attendees of our study groups and courses who thanked me for teaching them things which changed their lives." Edith and Milton are retired in Florida where she has been a 10 year volunteer of Hope Hospice. She still tries "to practice Adler"s prescription to 'every day do something to give another pleasure'. It works", claims Edith.

Cameron cites his authorship of two chapters for Perceiving Behavior Becoming, the 1962 yearbook of the Association for Supervision and Curriculum, as his top contribution. "This yearbook became the primer for 3rd Force psychology and was the best selling yearbook over the years—probably close to one million sold." He also considers significant his work as Dean and professor at Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville. Betty and he are both frequent contributors of articles on Adlerian psychology for local newspapers.
