NASAP Offers Two Training Opportunities

May Convention Features Over Five Days of Workshops and Presentations

NASAP '94 in San Diego will kick off with a special 2-1/2 day pre-convention course on Adlerian Couples Therapy with Jane Griffith and Robert L. Powers as presenters. This course will provide a model for intervention with variosexually-adapted couples from the initial interview through termination. It runs from May 17, 1 p.m through May 19, 5 p.m. and 18 CE hours may be earned. NBCC credit will also be available and physicians may claim 18 hours of Category 2 CME.

Participants can earn up to 26 hours of CE and NBCC credits during the four-day Convention/Workshops, May 19-22. The program includes nine one-day, pre and post workshops and 44 convention presentations of 60, 90 and 150 minutes.

Mental health professionals can further develop and improve their therapeutic skills through an intensive Adlerian training session offered by NASAP's Summer Institute July 17-22 on the University of South Florida campus in Tampa, FL. President's Message:

LRPC Presents Outlines For Two Goals

In the previous issue of the Newsletter, I outlined some of the history of the Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC) and began to detail some of the draft of the Long Range Plan for NASAP. Again, let me emphasize that this is a draft. The purpose of presenting it to you now is to receive your input and ideas. Please, write the LRPC at the central office concerning your ideas so that they may be considered in the final Long Range Plan. NASAP is not run by an elite group. We are a democratic organization and all such organizations require the input of all members if they are to thrive.

I will outline the Strategies and Tactics of Goals 1 and 3 in this issue. Goals 2 and 4 will be covered in the next issue.

Goal 1: To establish leadership structures and functions which advance the mission of NASAP throughout North America.

Strategy A: Establish a governance structure to operationalize the mission of NASAP with optimal efficiency and effectiveness.

Tactics: 1) Investigate other national organizations with similar missions, as well as other groups which are heterogeneous in theory (e.g., professional organizations of psychologists, educators, social workers, etc., independent of theoretical orientation), as to their governance structures, and evaluate these regarding their efficiency and effectiveness, along with any problems inherent in such structures. 2) Include NASAP members in the process of organizational restructuring through consultation and planning sessions.

Create an annual review and training process for officers of NASAP to ensure activities are congruent with the mission statement and related annual goals.
 Assign primary responsibility for programs and services with NASAP staff, with the President and Delegate Assembly serving as the governing board setting policy and priorities and evaluating performance.

Strategy B: Establish an administrative and financial structure designed to implement the goals, strategies, and tactics of NASAP.

Tactics: 1) Develop job descriptions for NASAP employees congruent with the mission statement and Goal 1, Strategy A. 2) Delineate the skills and knowledge necessary for personnel to meet these job descriptions; assess training and personnel needs for the next five years (e.g., database management, grant writing, coordinator for professional development programs, conference planner, etc.) 3) Design a new role for the President as a continental leader, and review and evaluate election procedures for the office of President. 4 Review, assess, and, if needed, alter the present allocation and use of NASAP funds in accordance with the changes specified above.

Strategy C: Create a continental presence for Individual Psychology.

<u>Tactics:</u> 1) Offer national conference programs, manuals, and resource personnel to assist regional and local Adlerian groups in learning the "how to's" of initiating and/or fostering the development and expansion of Individual Psychology. 2) Set up cooperative ventures between and among national and international Adlerian groups in public relations, training programs, etc. 3) Celebrate and encourage local groups to develop by

Delegate Column

A Memorable Weekend With The Masters of IP

Attendees at the Founders' Day of the Adler School of Professional Psychology on February 25 and 26 enjoyed the singular experience of being enlightened by the personalities and wisdom of seven active, youthful "Senior Adlerians" who belied the appellation "senior."

An Award of Special Recognition was presented to Bronia Grunwald for her 40 years of service to the Adler School and to Adlerian principles, which she has propagated here and abroad. Closely linked to Dreikurs since his arrival here, she has particularly taught and expanded Adler's and Dreikurs' views in education and family counseling.

Leo Gold, our house sage, treated us to an exposition of Chaos Theory as an Holistic Conceptual Model for the Future Evolution of Adlerian Thought and Practice. Chaos theory is an attempt to grasp the seemingly unpredictable movement of highly complex, multi-determined phenomena such as the weather. Human personality is also effected by uncountable causes, including one's own creativity, so that, like the weather, it defies other than probabilistic, stochastic explanations and forecasts. Gold related Chaos Theory to Adler's dictum, "Everything can also be otherwise," and Dreikurs' espousal of the indeterminacy principle instead of strictly linear thinking.

Oscar Christensen, who has educated a couple generations of Adlerian-trained families and counselors, spoke On the Education of an Adlerian Counselor. He shared his methods and philosophy of counselor education, how he has developed and supervised his students as closely as medical interns are supervised in teaching hospitals. He bemoaned the demise of his department at the University of Arizona, as well as those of other universities. In his opinion, the emphasis on training parents, teachers, and counselors is "the heart and soul" of Individual Psychology.

Manford Sonstegard, who has both retired and returned frequently to the practice and propagation of Adlerian counseling, likewise deplored the fact that counseling is apparently on the defensive while the violent nature of our country becomes ever more intensified. He reminded us of the importance of Dreikurs' methods of conflict resolution, starting with how to pinpoint the real issues in a conflict. He is still traveling the world, a virtual St. Paul of Adlerian thinking, supervising and training counselors.

providing supportive services during the initial stages, e.g., mailing lists, speakers on a gratis or reduced-fee basis, advising, etc. 4) Annually recognize and honor the work of NASAP members on continental, regional, and community levels.

Strategy D: Utilize available resources to provide leadership training for members to facilitate the use of Individual Psychology at local levels.

Tactics: 1) Set up cooperative ventures with non-Adlerian organizations in public relations, training programs, etc. 2) Identify opportunities for NASAP visibility at non-Adlerian conferences, conventions, etc. (eg., NEA, ASCA, ACA, APA, AAMFT, NASSP, NAESP, NSBA). 3) Recognize leaders and those with leadership qualities at the local level, and assist them (see Strategy C, Tactic 1).

Goal 3: To increase the viability and utilization of Adlerian theory and practice.

Strategy A: To ensure the initiation, completion, and dissemination of research and scholarly projects in Individual Psychology.

Tactics: 1) Support and promote the translation and publication of the collected works of Adler by December, 1996. 2) Allocate funds annually for Adlerian research activities by NASAP members, with an emphasis to be placed on research in diversity issues. 3) Consolidate and update a computer database of all Adlerian publications, building on the Mosaks' bibliographies and on Frank Main's Adlerian registry, and make discs of this database available to writers and researchers. 4) Consolidate and update a computer database of all Adlerian research, published and unpublished (e.g., dissertations) for use by writers and researchers.

Strategy B: To foster the development, conservation, and dissemination of media resources that serve as foundational materials for training, research, theory, and practice.

<u>Tactics:</u> 1) Enlist the support of the Publicity/Development Committee of the Delegate Assembly to oversee the accomplishment of this strategy.

Strategy C: To foster, support, and provide training in Individual Psychology.

Tactics: 1) Provide opportunities for experiential learning and supervised practice with skilled Individual Psychology professionals. 2) Encourage and support the development of graduate level training that emphasizes Individual Psychology.

3 Assist individuals and groups meeting specified criteria in

presenting NASAP-sponsored training.

Strategy D: To collaborate with other organizations in theory, research, and advocacy efforts.

Tactics: 1) Assign an appropriate NASAP member to act as a liaison with each of a number of designated professional organizations (e.g., IAMFC, APA, AAMFT). 2) Coordinate NASAP annual and/or regional meetings with meetings of other selected professional groups. 3) Encourage NASAP members to share Adlerian ideas with non-Adlerian individuals and groups, both formally, through presentations and workshops at other professional meetings, and informally.

Strategy E: To assume a leadership role in the use of Individual Psychology with diverse populations.

Tactics: 1) Promote membership in the Society among diverse populations, and foster NASAP leadership from among these members. 2) Solicit a plan from each section to enhance the involvement of NASAP members of diverse populations in Section activities (e.g., Section sponsorship of membership fees). 3) Send brochures to professionals among diverse populations (e.g., African-American social workers) and to those in training at African-American or other minority colleges and universities to acquaint them with Individual Psychology and to invite their membership in the Society.

In Memoriam

Word has been received that JoAnne M. Hahn died on February 10 in Mancos, CO. JoAnne joined NASAP in 1973, when she was a student at the Alfred Adler Institute in Chicago. She served on NASAP's Delegate Assembly in 1979 and 1981-84. During that time she was instrumental in the formation of the Women's Issues Committee, was co-chair and played an active role in that committee's various activities. One focus was on language and the Constitution and By-Laws were revised to include inclusive language.

JoAnne began her professional career as a therapist in Chicago, continuing her work in San Francisco, where she led workshops and seminars through her consulting practice and the Miracles Foundation of San Francisco, which she founded.

JoAnne once said of herself, "Some Adlerians have described me as a 'bit of a rebel,' and that may be my major contribution to Individual Psychology -- suggesting alternative ways of doing things that could bring us closer to living the equality and cooperation and harmony for which we all long."

Eva Dreikurs Ferguson presented a paper on Social Interest and Achievement Strivings. A pioneer in bringing Adlerian psychology to the halls of ivy, she is an author with her second book on motivation about to appear, an experimental psychologist, and theoretician. She related Adlerian principles to academic motivational theory. She told how Adler himself moved from striving for superiority to striving for belonging and contribution. She reminded us of the danger of the trend toward "pseudo-equality" and "victimization" in American life.

Cameron Meredith related Adlerian psychology to "third force psychology" in *Beyond Behavioristic and Freudian Psychology*. The story of how his encounter with Dreikurs affected all his subsequent work enthralled the audience. Most of Meredith's life has been spent educating counselors and families, but in the last decade he has switched to the private practice of psychotherapy. Those who know him sometimes call him "Mr. Encouragement."

Harold Mosak spoke on Where We've Been, Where We're Heading. After Dreikurs, one of the first Adlerian Psychotherapists in America -- at least one of the first to actively propagate the theory -- he is uniquely situated to recount the difficult but surprisingly successful development of Individual Psychology in America. From being "rare birds" Adlerians now have waxed numerous, with several training locales, some Masters degrees, a doctors degree, and increasing influence and respectability. Mosak has been and continues to be at the helm of this movement.

In Memoriam

The Adlerian community lost a dedicated international disseminator of Individual Psychology with the untimely death of Achi Yotam on February 24 in Tel Aviv, Israel, from a fast growing cancer. He was a popular lecturer and teacher, not only in Israel, but in various parts of the world. Locations in North America where he taught included Bowie, MD: Elk Grove, CA; Toronto, ON and Vancouver, BC.

Achi was a co-chairperson of ICASSI Board of Directors, an ICASSI faculty member, a board and staff member of the Alfred Adler Institute of Tel Aviv, lecturer at University of Tel Aviv, and In-service Training Director for Tel Aviv's Department of Social Welfare. In addition, he conducted open forum family counseling demonstrations weekly on TV in Israel.

Book of the Month: Individual Psychology Theory and Practice

This 300-page publication, co-authored by Guy J. Manaster and Raymond J. Corsini, is now back in print from the Alfred Adler School of Professional Psychology. NASAP is offering it to members for the specially-

The book is written to serve as a general introductory text to Adlerian psychology, and to provide presentations of case histories. Originally published in 1982, the text begins with an outline and brief history of Adlerian psychology, discusses various aspects of IP theory of personality through six chapters, outlines various approaches to Adlerian counseling and therapy in chapters 10 through 15 and concludes with the personal views of the authors and a 40-page chapter of case histories. "We attempted to systematically gather all major ideas so that there would be some discussion about everything important...," the authors comment in the preface.
