Convention Panel Seeks Input In Adapting Adlerian Ideas For Changing Families

Families and parents are changing. Not only are there more single and blended families, there are homeless families, families with two same sex parents, families from other cultures, parents who are in jail, on drugs, abusive, or even still children themselves. As Adlerians we are well aware of the effectiveness and universality of our parenting principles and techniques and know that we have something very important to contribute. However, many of us feel challenged by the necessity to adapt old materials so that they will be sensitive to the needs of today's parents.

In an attempt to address some of these concerns, we are going to try a new model for one of our convention programs. The program, entitled Adapting Adlerian Parenting Groups For Diverse Populations will be led by a panel consisting of some of the Adlerians who are working with parents from many different backgrouds.

Each panel member will discuss his/her experience of adapting materials for a variety of situations and share examples of handouts they have developed for their groups. We are requesting that other Adlerians who have something to share bring their own concerns and successes.

The panel includes: Cheryl Erwin, Riki Intner, Amy Lew, Mary Maguire, Miller Garrison, Frank Main, Michael Popkin, Henry Raymond, Gary McKay and Barbara Smailey. Topics include: court ordered parents, parents in recovery, parents of different backgrounds in the inner city, women in poverty, Native American families, parents of disturbed/disturbing kids and an Adlerian violence prevention program. The agenda will be open to other areas of concern as well. All contributions are welcome.

Executive Director's Message:

Action Items Feature NASAP '95

In November, the Executive Committee and Standing Committees of the Delegate Assembly (D.A.) discussed a number of items concerning conventions, the journal and newsletter, promotion of Adlerian ideas, inclusivity, elections, continuing education, and organizational matters. Some of this discussion resulted in action being taken by the D.A. and several items require further study of committees for action in May and November of 1995.

In the January issue of the newsletter, Marcia Mullins outlined the approved regional reorganization and Mary Maguire reported on action taken regarding the Certificate of Study in Adlerian Psychology, the Ansbacher annual lectureship, and the Summer Training Institute. Convention action items approved by the D.A. include:

- To print the full program in the registration flier that is to be mailed in February and to use the registration flier for the on-site convention program, including an insert with the summary descriptions of presentations.
- To again hold all section meetings during the same time slot on Friday.
 - To allot a 75 minute time slot for Section and Region meetings.
 - · To provide additional registration incentives.
- To hold a Silent Auction at the 1995 convention. Joyce McKay was appointed organizer and details will appear in future newsletters.

The D.A. approved the following motions presented by other committees for action:

- Appointment of James R. Bitter as Editor of the Practice & Applications issues of the Journal beginning in 1996, when Jon Carlson's term expires.
- Request Journal editors to submit written annual reports to central office by April 1 of each year.
 - Provide for a staffed membership table at convention.
 - · To pursue the creation of an Adlerian calendar for sale by NASAP.
- To provide complimentary newsletter subscriptions for one year to chairpersons of counseling or psychology departments at universities in area of convention, first priority to minorities.
- To develop a column in the newsletter offering concrete tips for dealing with specific issues related to parenting, teaching or business.
- Approval for the final design for the certificate for NASAP Certificate of Study in Adlerian Psychology.
- Add to the D.A. job description a provision that the designated chair of each committee confer quarterly with the E.C. liaison to that committee to insure continuity of work for committees.
 - Several cuts were made in the 1994 budget to lower the deficit.

The newly formed <u>Social Equality Committee</u> focused on its purpose and its mission, inviting the D.A. to join in the discussion. Watch for information in future issues of the newsletter.

Items presented for discussion and for future study:

• Possibility of holding convention on Saturday-Sunday; pre-convention workshops on Thursday-Friday. (Continued on page six)

Confessions of a Complainer (or)

It was a dark and stormy night, and I was complaining!! Nothing new. I complain a lot. It's my life-style, and I'm good at it. Anyway...actually, it was several dark and stormy nights, and I was constantly complaining about how NASAP conventions are organized and run. Not big complaints, mind you, just little nitpicky whines about the location, the timing, the hotel, the presentations -- you know the stuff -- wondering how "they" could have possibly chosen where, when and who for the conference.

I complained about the decisions, the people who were making the decisions, and how the decisions were made. Then, in a flash of lightening (it does that on dark and stormy nights), I was elected to the Delegate Assembly (that's another long story that I won't go into). I was appointed to the Conference Committee (I asked to be appointed so I could change the world -- or at least the conference), and lo and behold, I was part of the "they" who were making choices.

In Memoriam

Longtime NASAP member and active Indiana Adlerian Homer Kiracofe was killed in an automobile accident December 7.

His involvement with Adlerian thinking and ideas goes back over 30 years when he received certificates from the Alfred Adler Institute of Chicago in family and marital counseling. He and other northeast Indiana Adlerians founded the Alfred Adler Institute of Fort Wayne in 1974 and he has regularly attended the NASAP conventions since 1975.

Among his contribution was creation of a course for parents based on Children the Challenge, prior to the development of any formalized programs. When he was honored at the NASAP convention in 1989, it was noted that he and Ron Pancner educated over 3,500 families with this course. He conducted free open forum family counseling sessions on a monthly basis at various church locations and demonstrated at a counseling center in the inner city. He also helped develop the family therapy program at Charter Beacon Hospital in Fort Wayne.

At his memorial service December 11, the minister commented that he wouldn't be at all surprised if Homer didn't already have a parenting group started in heaven.

His family has established a memorial scholarship fund for AAIFW students entering the Adler School of Professional Psychology's masters program in marriage and family counseling. Send donations to Jan Richmond, AAIFW, 1720 Beacon St., Fort Wayne, IN 46805.

April Event To Help Fund Adler Translation Project

"Making Alfred Adler Come Alive" is a special banquet/program to be held April 8 at the Webster University Center in St. Louis, MO to raise funds for translating the works of Alfred Adler. Featured speakers are Kurt Adler, Bernard Shulman and Edward Hoffman, author of The Drive For Self, a new Adler biography.

The translation project was initiated in 1991 by Henry Stein and partly funded by the NASAP Clinical Section. Most of Adler's published German journal articles have been translated so far. "We are currently working on unpublished German and Dutch manuscripts of Adler's articles and lectures," Stein said. "In the next phase, we are planning to translate his unpublished letters and to re-translate several books." Funding of \$36,000 is needed for this phase, he said.

Book of the Month: How You Feel Is Up To You

If you are upset by so many books which espouse Adlerian ideas without reference to Adler or other Adlerians, then you will be delighted by this book written by Gary McKay and Don Dinkmeyer, Sr. If you want an Adlerian book which integrates the best ideas of other theorists, clinicians and counselors, then this is that book. If you are tired of self-help books that have no "meat", this book is for you.

As you might expect of an Adlerian book on emotions it is based on (to use the subtitle to chapter 2), "How your beliefs create your feelings." The book has separate chapters devoted to Guilt, Anger, Depression, Stress, Anxiety and Joy. In addition, there are chapters on visualization, communicating feelings and conflict solving. All of the chapters are useful, but I found the chapter on visualization to be particularly enlightening.

The book is loaded with checklists, short questionnaires, exercises and charts which help individuals apply the principles to themselves. At the end of each chapter, the authors provide a three-step ACE formula (A-Accept yourself and your feelings, C-Choose new purposes, beliefs and feelings;, E-Execute your new choices) to help the reader make changes. recommend this book "off the shelf" to anyone looking for help in making emotional changes in their life but it would be of particular benefit for therapists or counselors as a reference book for clients. In this way, particular chapters, questionnaires and assignments can be emphasized. benefit of a book that has so much "meat" is that there is much with which to work. I quite like this book and plan to use it with a number of my clients. It is a very readable book. I reviewed it on my Christmas vacation and continually had to wrestle it from the hands of my 84 year old father-in-law! At the same time, it will be refreshing to use a self-help book that won't be subject to the complaint that it could have been written in 25 pages. My heartfelt thanks to Gary McKay and Don Dinkmeyer!
