Baltimore Will Provide Setting For NASAP's '96 Convention

The 44th Annual NASAP Convention and Workshops will be held in Baltimore, Maryland June 20-23 at the Radisson Plaza Lord Baltimore Hotel. This event will be hosted by the McAbee Adlerian Psychology Society and will feature the theme -- Social Equality: Advancing the Dream.

A registered historical landmark, the Lord Baltimore Hotel has been completely refurbished and will offer convention participants the ambiance of early America combined with all the modern conveniences. It is located in the heart of the city only three blocks from the inner harbor and walking distance from entertainment and the financial district. Room rates will not exceed \$94 per night for standard rooms.

Baltimore itself has been revitalized over the past 15 years and offers variety of attractions with its strong historic past. In addition to its scenic waterfront, it has a myriad of restaurants (many featuring the best in seafood), numerous cultural attractions, the National Aquarium, the Lexington Market, and the Orioles baseball team.

Proposal forms for the workshops and convention presentations have been mailed to all NASAP members. Additional forms are available from the central office.

President's Message:

'Quality' Key Word Of Minneapolis Convention

It seems that our NASAP year revolves around the convention, one of our most visible projects, a networking and training support to many members, a method of outreach to the general community, a time and place for our annual meetings and a source of funds for our budget. As I am writing this we have just completed the Minneapolis Convention, which was wonderful. Many people commented about the keynote and how it set a tone for the weekend, the carry through of the theme, the quality of the presentations and the friendliness of the people, particularly the convention volunteers and the hotel staff.

Larry Hedberg, President of the Alfred Adler Institute of Minnesota (AAIM), the local host group, and the staff, students and alumni of AAIM, under the direction of Jonathan Bundt, did an incredible job of getting us all registered and keeping things running smoothly throughout the weekend. Thank you for all of the hard work and warm hospitality.

We are now in the midst of planning for the 1996 Convention in Baltimore, with the McAbee Adlerian Psychology Society (MAPS) serving as the host group and Steven J. Stein, local chair. The Maryland group has a history of successful regional conferences, and seems excited and ready to tackle the NASAP convention. We'll look forward to seeing you all there!

In spite of our success with the quality of our conventions, we continue to attract low numbers; we will be working hard to find ways to turn this trend around. The Convention Committee of the Delegate Assembly is considering ways to increase the effectiveness of the marketing of the convention, and better ways to meet the needs of the members and others who might attend. Many suggestions have been made, including changing the dates, moving to college campuses (or alternating college campuses with hotels), collaborating with other organizations, and changing the structure.

Your Executive Committee and D.A. were busy, as usual, during their meetings as routine business and many projects were discussed. The 2nd annual NASAP Summer Institute is being held in Boca Raton, Florida on June 25-30, 1995. At the time of our meeting 37 people had already registered, with over half being non-members; this meets our goal of offering intensive training to members while also spreading Adlerian ideas. We have also approved a process for people to apply to teach the 1996 Institute (see insert). The Long Range Planning Committee has recommended some priorities regarding the many goals and objectives of the Long Range Plan, and we will be discussing those in detail in a later newsletter.

We had two international visitors to our D.A. meeting: Horst Groner, Secretary General of the International Association of Individual Psychology (who attended the whole convention and extended an invitation for us to attend the I.A.I.P. Congress in England, in August 1996) and Jozsef Sandor, a leading member of the Hungarian Association of Individual Psychology (see letter, page 2). Please remember that our meetings are open to anyone, and feel free to attend if you arrive early to the Baltimore convention. And, as always, please let your representatives on the D.A. know if you have any ideas, questions, or concerns. We're looking forward to hearing from you.

Convention Banquet Toasts Kurt Adler's 90th Birthday



Letter To The Editor

Let me second both Ray Corsini's letter and Marcia Mullins' article in recent issues. (March/April and May 1995)

They question and challenge the appropriateness of a "Social Interest Award": I agree with what they say.

And let me add a further, "doctrinal" consideration. "Social Interest" is both an inaccurate and misleading translation of Adler's original ideas and terminology, and also has (at least in current American usage) a much narrower and overly "unselfish" meaning and connotation than the so much more meaningful and richer "Gemeinschaftsgefuhl" of Adler.

"Reward" -- as well as "punishment" -- is generally frowned upon in all of "Adlerian" childrearing manuals: isn't it time that the Association apply to itself what it preaches to others?

And if in deference to human frailty, or whatever other reason, NASAP does feel the need to solicit contributions from its members by rewards and awards: call it something else, and don't trivialize Gemeinschaftsgefuhl, not even in its inaccurate English translation.

Book of the Month: The Family That Works Together...

The Family That Works Together..., a recent release authored by Lynn Lott and Riki Intner (Prima Publishing), is an expanded and rewritten version of their earlier book, Family Work: Whose Job Is It?.

In typical Lott/Intner style, they have written a book full of humor, concrete ideas and solutions, and vignettes from real life that will surprise you, make you laugh, and fill you with hope. This is not only a book which is structured to help get the material off the page and into your life, it's also a darn good read.

Having used the earlier edition (Family Work) with success in my own family and with numerous clients, I appreciated the addition of sections detailing the use of family meetings, working things out as a blended family, living with roommates, dealing with adult kids who sometimes move back home (or don't leave right away), and including elder parents. I especially like the whole chapters on teaching money management and maintaining cooperation with teenagers.

The book does a good job of putting the nasty necessity of "chores" into context so that they become an opportunity for better family relationships as well as building self esteem and teaching life skills to everyone. Bet you didn't know the odious task of keeping things organized and clean could do all that. Well, you learn something new every day.

NASAP Summer Institute

As you are aware, NASAP held the first Summer Institute in 1994 in Tampa, Florida. Encouraged by the success of that Institute (it was very well received by participants and it made a modest amount of money), NASAP is continuing the Summer Institute program again in 1995, this time in Boca Raton. Registrations are well ahead of last year and for that we are indebted to the team of Bill Nicoll, Oscar Christensen, Clair Hawes and Jim Bitter.

It has always been the Delegate Assembly's (D.A.) intention to continue and expand the Institute program. Accordingly, buoyed by the success of the current program we are soliciting proposals for Summer Institutes in 1996. It is possible that more than one proposal will be chosen if there is no overlap in the type of participants that will be attracted.

The following is an outline of some of what is required but you will need to get an application form from the Central Office in Chicago for more specifics. Completed application must be postmarked no later than September 15, 1995.

The Summer Institute program has several significant differences from our annual convention:

- 1. Applicants are responsible for site selection and accommodation.
- 2. Applicants or their designates are responsible for on site coordination and administration.
- 3. Applicants or their designates are responsible for marketing and targeting the participant population and the design and printing of promotional materials.
- 4. Applicants are responsible for setting and adhering to a budget.
- 5. The coordinator, who may be one of the presenters or another individual or group, will be paid, as will all presenters. The amount of remuneration will be part of your proposal.

While some NASAP members will want to attend the Institute, it is anticipated that most of the participants will come from outside NASAP. This has been our experience in 1994 and so I suggest that you consider how to market the Institute to non-NASAP members.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the Summer Institute is to provide in-depth training in Adlerian Psychology for mental health and education professionals throughout North America. It is intended that the Summer Institute will focus on different specialization areas (e.g. marriage and family, substance abuse, clinical, education, business and organizations, family education) and utilize different presenters from NASAP's distinguished membership. The Summer Institute seems to meet the growing need among mental health and education specialists for in-depth, post-graduate training opportunities that simultaneously enhance or broaden their professional skills while also meeting licensure renewal and/or recertification requirements in their respective jurisdictions.

CONTRACTUAL AGREEMENTS

1.) Summer Institute is to operate as a sponsored continuing education function of NASAP. 2.) The Past President of NASAP shall serve as the liaison with the D.A. unless the President, with the approval of the D.A., specifies another appointee. 3.) A Coordinator shall be approved by the E.C. who shall be responsible for the promotion, budget, coordination of presenters, registration, and all on-site coordination. This will be a paid position, such remuneration to be approved by the D.A. 4.) The Summer Institute is a project of NASAP, who is solely responsible for the content, format, location, personnel, professional accreditation and the like. 5.) Every effort should be made by the Coordinator to liaison with and, where practical, to involve any local and/or regional Adlerian group which is an affiliate of NASAP. It should be noted, however, that this is a NASAP event, not a local or regional event, and that all decisions regarding the Summer Institute are the sole responsibility of NASAP. No financial agreement with a local group shall be permitted unless it is part of the original proposal and, as such, is approved by the D.A. in advance. 5.) The Coordinator shall arrange for a public presentation or demonstration in the local area at some time during the Summer Institute. This presentation shall be coordinated, where possible, with any local Adlerian groups. 6.) All presenters agree to abide by the APA and NBCC Ethical Principles as they might apply to this Institute.
