Summer Institute Scores Big Success In Boca Raton

Fifty people attended NASAP's Summer Training Institute in Boca Raton, FL last month, representing a 79 percent increase in attendance over last year's Institute, according to coordinator Bill Nicoll. "This clearly indicates a strong market for more extensive, quality training in applications of Adlerian psychology."

Institute attendees came from ten U.S. states, three Canadian provinces, Australia and Russia, Nicoll reports. They ranged from graduate students in counseling to professionals seeking continuing education; participants new to Adler to a few NASAP "old timers" looking for a refresher. Of the registrants, 28 percent were NASAP members and 72 percent non-members. Evaluations showed high marks for accommodations and facilities, as well as instruction and family counseling demonstrations, he said.

Participants new to Adlerian psychology requested information on NASAP and ICASSI '96. One has already chosen to join NASAP and two others left with the intention of looking into registering for ICASSI '95, if space was still available. "This confirms our hypothesis that a good training program would feed into other existing programs rather than compete with them," Nicoll noted.

Executive Director's Message

DA Defines Governing Positions

Even though the June/July Newsletter contained an article on NASAP honoring staff members, I would be remiss if I did not make some comments. I was completely and pleasantly surprised at the banquet in Minneapolis with the commemoration of my 20 years with NASAP. It would not have happened without extraordinary work by Mary Maguire and Jerianne Garber. My thanks to them and to all those who sent greetings or otherwise participated in the surprise event. I have appreciated the opportunity to work with so many encouraging and caring individuals and look forward to continuing with NASAP.

The Delegate Assembly took action on several items presented by committees at its meeting in Minneapolis. The following are items not reported in the June/July issue.

Officer Job Descriptions

The Delegate Assembly provides that the officers serve as the Executive Committee and describes the duties of the E.C. as a whole, but does not define the individual officer's duties. The Constitution Committee drew up job descriptions for each of the officers, which were subsequently approved by the D.A. In addition to duties associated with the name of the office, the Secretary and the Treasurer are to participate in the activities of a Standing Committee.

The job descriptions for the two vice presidents call for one to assume the regular duties of a vice president and to chair the Standing Committee on Development/PR/Membership. The other vice president is to attend to matters of the annual convention and other workshops and to serve as Chair of the Standing Committee on Convention/Workshops.

Numerous responsibilities for the President are described in the Constitution and By-Laws and the Committee put all of these into the job description for the President.

Convention/Workshop Committee

A statement was added to the proposal form noting that the presenter agrees to abide by the APA Ethical Principles as they might apply to his/her presentation.

The previous recommendation to go to Snowmass in Colorado in 1997 was rescinded and the committee will look for a new site with a local organization. (Note: A proposal has been received from APABC inviting NASAP to Vancouver in 1997.)

With the resignation of Linda Wise, a new contract is needed for Convention Coordinator. The committee drew up a new expanded job description and recommended that there be a search for a Meeting Planner; that applicants be reviewed by a hiring committee composed of the President, First and Second Vice Presidents and the Executive Director.

Development/PR/Membership Committee

To increase linkage and practical information sharing from local organizations to NASAP and back out to general membership, the committee recommended that Regional Delegates make formal, regular contact with heads of local Adlerian organizations and affiliates to collect

Major Psychology Magazine Recognizes Adler

In the May/June issue of Psychology Today, a popular consumer magazine, an article highlighting Edward Hoffman's recent biography of Alfred Adler, The Drive For Self, calls Adler "the father of self-help." The opening paragraph states: "If America's favorite pastimes are sex and

baseball, self-help groups might run a close third. So it's a bit of a surprise to learn that such an American institution owes its existence to a Viennese psychoanalyst who became an archenemy of Freud and whose theory of human happiness was behind it all."

The article gives a brief description of Adler's life and cites some of his important contributions to modern psychological theory. Quoting Hoffman, it notes that Freud's view of human nature was "dark and sensual" compared to Adler who was "bubblingly optimistic." In closing, the article states: "Now that Freud's in disfavor, Adler's star may be rising."

NASAP Members Come From All Professions

Information on the make-up of NASAP members gleaned from material being prepared for the 1995 NASAP Membership Directory:

Occupation: About 52% of 1995 NASAP members list some area of counseling as their major occupation. This includes psychologist, psychotherapist, psychiatrist, therapist, social worker and counselor. About 11% list something to do with education, another 11% are students or interns, 4% administration, 3% medical, 3% retired, 2% consultant. Other occupations include: actor, business, clergy, deputy sheriff, homemaker, marketing, mediator, physicist, promoter of Adlerian Psychology, retailer, sales, speaker, state trooper and syndicated columnist.

Education: About 8% of 1995 NASAP members have a bachelor's degree, 48% a masters, 27% a doctor's degree and 3% have an M.D. degree.



Three Receive New Certificate of Study

Elaine Davies, Daniel Eckstein and Nancy Kuykendall are the first recipients of NASAP'S new Certificate of Study in Adlerian Psychology. The certificates were awarded at the Convention banquet.

The Certificate is available to members who have 90 hours of documented training from attendance at NASAP conventions, training institutes, or regional conferences. Of the 90 hours, at least 24 must be from intensive workshops. Intensive is defined as one full day or at least six or more hours.

Until January, 1996, special consideration will be given those who have completed study hours prior to the establishment of current standards, and requirements may be waived on an individual basis. Applications are available from the central office.

Publications Committee

It was recommended that advertising be accepted for the Newsletter, to be printed on an insert page; price to be set by the E.C. after central office has collected relevant cost information; that a disclaimer statement be included regarding non-endorsement.

Committees were not able to cover all their agenda items and will be working on them for presentation at the next meeting to be held the first weekend in November.



Can We Make Our Children Happy?

The most important task any of us could have is the task of parenting our children. Yet this is the one task where mandatory education or licensing is not required -- and children do not come with an owner's manual!

How do we learn how to parent? The reality is that we learn from our own parents and from the so-called "experts". Since the middle of the century, these experts have legitimately been warning us that coercive and punitive approaches to parenting damages a child's self-esteem and is therefore undesirable. However, they have also educated us to believe that we must not do anything to our children that might make them unhappy or uncomfortable, and that by doing so we diminish the child's sense of personal worth. Our job, they insist, is to assure that our children are always happy, always comfortable.

Based on my years of experience as a parent, parent educator and family counselor, I am convinced that we have all been deceived. The "experts" formula, that happiness + comfort = self-esteem does not add up.

How is self-esteem developed? Where does it come from? The answer is in the term. Self-esteem can only come from ourselves, from a belief in ourselves and our own ability and competence. The belief in ourselves, our sense of self-sufficiency is only derived by having the opportunity to handle things ourselves, to be given the responsibility to manage a new task, a new territory. The formula above directly subtracts from this process. Parents who see it as their job to make their children happy help foster dependency, which is the exact opposite of self-sufficiency and self-esteem. Parents who strive to make their children comfortable deny their children the opportunity to take on a new challenge, which will naturally be uncomfortable.

For a child with self-esteem, when a new challenge arises he/she thinks, "This is a challenge, a problem, and I have a good person to rely upon: me." Whereas the dependent child thinks: "Where is the person who can solve this problem for me?"

Self-sufficiency and self-esteem can be fostered in very specific ways. For example: (1) Giving a young child the experience of sleeping in his/her own bed, and refusing to permit the child to sleep in the parent's bed. (2) Handing the responsibility for school performance and school problems to our children (while staying interested in the learning process, and making ourselves available as consultants.) (3) Teaching our children to do their own laundry and then handing this task over to them. (4) Giving our children in their early teen years the responsibility of choosing and managing their own bedtime.

An interesting life paradox is that by trying to make our children happy and comfortable, we are sure of adding to their discomfort and misery as they face life as a dependent person. By allowing them the opportunity to take on more and more life responsibilities with every passing year, which will include some unhappiness and discomfort, we are giving them the greatest gift imaginable: the gift of self-esteem.
