### Lord Baltimore Will Provide Vintage Class For NASAP '96

Elegance is the word that best describes the Radisson Plaza Lord Baltimore Hotel, site of NASAP's 1996 Convention and Workshops, June 20--23. Recently restored to its heydays of the 1920's, the 440 room facility is lavishly endowed with murals, carved moldings, brass railings and marble pillars. The updated hotel is now attached to the Convention Center, Inner Harbor and Arena by skywalk to offer convenience with old world beauty.

Attendees at next year's convention will find that the best amenities also come with their stay at the Lord Baltimore. There are over 18,000 square feet of meeting and banquet facilities, a fitness center complete with whirlpool and sauna, and two restaurants all within the hotel.

Located in the heart of the city, the Lord Baltimore is walking distance from Oriole Park at Camden Yards and the National Aquarium. It provides visitors with the best of both old and new in the city of Baltimore. For NASAP conventioneers, room rates will not exceed \$94 per night for standard rooms.

## NASAP Projects -- Current And Future

One of the items raised for discussion at the General Assembly (G.A.) luncheon at the 1995 Convention asked for ideas about projects NASAP could be undertaking. There were a number of suggestions that will be passed onto the Standing Committees. However, one of the comments served as a gentle reminder of the necessity to communicate. Instead of giving an idea for a project, the member asked for progress reports on current projects, noting that "like headline stories in the newspaper that fade into memory, I'm left wondering what happened to 'that'?" So, let us report on two of the projects referred to in that comment.

Endowment: In 1993, the Adler/Dreikurs Century Fund was established to create a substantial endowment fund to ensure that NASAP continues to be a communications link in spreading Adlerian principles throughout the world. To date the endowment fund stands at \$29,300. Forty-five members have pledged \$19,806 and \$9,494 has been donated by 61 members, two Sections, and one ICASSI attendee who is not a member. An ICASSI alumnus issued a challenge to ICASSI alumni, offering to match any donations or pledges over \$50. Eight people accepted the challenge, donating \$1,686. This is an ongoing project and there will again be space provided on dues renewal notices for 1996 to donate or pledge to this fund.

Clonick Publications Grant: There is still \$20,000 remaining in the Clonick Estate Publications Grant, which is intended to be a self-perpetuating fund for the promotion of Adlerian materials. The fund (limited to \$4,000 per person) is not intended as a subsidy for authors but is to be used primarily to cover publication costs for Adlerian materials that have limited publication scope but great relevance to the enhancement of Adlerian theory and practice. ## Discouraged, Not Dysfunctional

For some time, now I have been upset with the way the social services community uses the word *dysfunctional* in diagnosing and treating children and families. Used often as a diagnostic category, this term is assigned (I think) to families with difficulties that are numerous, resistant to change and inconsistent with the beliefs and tradition of, and therefore not understandable to the observer. *Dysfunctional* then, becomes a catch-all word which expresses helper's disapproval, dismay, feelings of incompetence and the resultant overcompensation in dealing with the family or individual.

The problem with the use of the word dysfunctional is that it prevents the observer from clearly investigating how the family actually does function. It is when the observer understands the behavior from the client's unique perspective that it becomes possible to see that the behavior is, in fact, functional and purposeful. Using an Adlerian perspective which sees each person as unique and self constructed, I suggest helpers seek to ascertain (1) what does the family (and each of its members) want? (2) What do they need from each other? (3) What are they each likely to do to get what they want and need? (4) And finally, what does the person do when the efforts to meet those needs are thwarted?

I believe clear understandings of these questions are needed before helpers can formulate what can be done to help individuals whose behaviors are seen as unusual when compared to community standards.

There are some concepts for understanding behavior from an Adlerian perspective: All behavior occurs in a social context. Every person searches for SIGNIFICANCE within the environment of the family and COMPETES for position of power within the family. In order to secure a place, one child may become the best child while another may become the worst child. Another may be favored by one parent, another may be conveyer of the family's values. Still another child may become helpless and weak. These positions are all seen as successful in securing a place. Within this context, each child must stake out a territory that includes attitudes and attributes which are designed to give feelings of worth.

When the message within the family is that of encouragement, courage, confidence, children become convinced that they can achieve this place by becoming useful and working on the useful side of life. On the other hand, if the place is not secure, if the child feels that she cannot sustain this place

Perhaps part of the solution to sustainable growth is knowing precisely why people joined in the first place and when they failed to renew, what were the factors that triggered that decision. In an effort to get this information, Regional Delegates will be phoning '95 non-renewals in November and asking for specifics as well as for reconsideration of their decision. of security by being useful, she is likely to display behaviors which are disjunctive toward others, unproductive to attaining her goal of significance or useless for peaceful communal living.

When the person or family acts in ways which puzzles or confuses the observer, words other than *dysfunction* may be applied. For instance, behaviors which are clearly disjunctive toward others, unproductive toward the goal of significance or communal living suggest that the person is discouraged -- not *dysfunctional*.

If there is a discrepancy between the self and the ideal self, (I am a woman but not a real woman) inferiority feelings ensue. These inferiority feelings are believed by Adler to be normal; that to live is to feel inferior. The problem occurs when the person begins to ACT "as if" they are inferior, because they feel inferior. That is when the person develops pathological symptoms. The personality process is sort of a rubber stamp in which the individual imposes upon every situation her understanding of herself, the world and herself in the world. Here she becomes somewhat of a constructionist which helps to make every experience consistent with what she already believes the world to be.

As creative people, we use emotion to fuel movement. We are not victims of emotions but create emotions to assist ourselves in getting done what we want done. We create feelings of anger, for instance, when we have learned that angry behavior gets people to leave us alone, to give us what we want, to show how powerful we are, or finally, to show that we are weak and can't control our tempers.

When looked at in these ways, behaviors of family members must not be seen as *dysfunctional*. However, when thought of as discouraged, a treatment modality may be used to steer the person's behavior into usefulness. I believe it is important to build a philosophy of **helping** which increases the well-being of families, rather than merely pathologize them, as is done with the use of *dysfunctional*.
