Prominent Vancouver Citizen Will Speak At Saturday Luncheon

Dr. David Lam, one of Vancouver's most encouraging and inspirational citizens, will speak at the 1997 Convention luncheon, Saturday, May 24. He is the former Lt. Governor of British Columbia, the province's highest non-political leader.

Lam has consistently sought out ways to assist and encourage his own Chinese community and the Canadian society at large. His gifts to the University of British Columbia and University of Victoria established a Management Research Centre and library, focusing on Pacific Rim economic activities and development, and an Asian Research Centre. He also contributed funds to build the Dr. Sun Yat-Sen Classical Garden in Vancouver, to establish the Police Centennial Museum, and donated land for the Regent College library.

Lam's personal agenda is to enhance the image of the Chinese community and to lead his compatriots by example. As part of this effort, he founded the Hong Kong Merchant's Association of Vancouver in 1967. This organization has served and assisted new immigrants from Hong Kong in settling in Canada.

His holistic vision of excellence blends together the best of the Chinese cultural influence with western advances in technology and economics. His vision of Canada includes a place where immigrants will not only find opportunity, but also contribute the best of their cultures. His imagination and generosity marks him as a "builder of community in the 21st. century."

Annual Meeting

Some time at the annual convention and workshops is devoted to annual meeting business for NASAP, which includes: a day-long meeting of the Delegate Assembly (D.A.) on Thursday, May 22, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.; a meeting of members at the General Assembly luncheon on Friday, May 23, 12:45 to 2:05 p.m.; Section Meetings on Friday, May 23, 11:20 a.m. to 12:35 p.m.; Region Meetings on Saturday, May 24, 11:20 a.m. to 12:35 p.m. The D.A. will be considering a proposal from the Long Range Planning Committee with regard to changes in the governance of the Society. This information will be shared with members during the General Assembly and with members via mail after the convention.

Membership

Among the reports to be considered by the D.A. will be one on membership. Currently, 1997 membership is about 6% below 1996; there has been a 90% increase in Associate members and a 16% increase in Student members. This year, we initiated a provision for students to renew at the student rate even though they graduated, giving them a maximum of 3 years after graduation. Thirty (30) students took advantage of the new policy, which is about 21% of the student membership.

New membership is up by 28%. To be noted, 26% of the new members from 1994 and from 1995 continue to be members; 35% of the 1996 new members have renewed for 1997.

Advancing the Dream: Toward A Global Ethic

Our convention last year reminded us of the dream of social equality. It brought out some of the good things that have come about over the years of struggle for social equality. In November, I had an opportunity to attend the Catholic Call to Action Meeting in Detroit, Michigan. One of the focuses of this conference was on the "Declaration Toward a Global Ethic," presented by theologian Hans Kung. For the first time in the history of religions, the Council of the Parliament of the World's Religions met in Chicago in the fall of 1993 and ventured to work out and present a "Declaration Toward a Global Ethic." Dr. Kung has made it his life's work to further the acceptance of this "Declaration." In reading over this work, I found this "Declaration" also to be a wonderful explication of the dream of social equality and very much in conformity with Adler's writing on social interest.

The "Declaration" was written by Dr. Kung and his colleagues with input from many world religious leaders. It was signed by representatives of Bahai, Dharma Kumaris, Buddhism, Christianity, Native Religion, Hinduism, Jainism, Judaism, Islam, Neo-pagans, Sikhs, Taoists, Theosophists, Zoroastrians and Inter-religious organizations. It was definitely a step forward in terms of trying to reach some type of reconciliation among all religions. As Dr. Kung has so often said, "There can be no peace among the nations without peace among the religions."

As I sat and listened to Dr. Kung talk about his vision of the "Declaration Toward a Global Ethic," I found it to be very familiar to me. It resounded with themes of responsibility for a better global order. It stated, "Our involvement for the sake of human rights, freedom, justice, peace, and the preservation of the Earth is absolutely necessary." It posed a fundamental human right: Every human being must be treated humanely (What you do not wish done to yourself, do not do to others! Or, in positive terms, What you wish done to yourself, do to others!) From it arose four ancient guidelines for human behavior: (1) Commitment to a culture of non-violence and respect for life; (2) Commitment to a culture of solidarity and a just economic order; (3) Commitment to a culture of tolerance and a life of truthfulness; and, (4) Commitment to a culture of equal rights and

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ENCOURAGING CHILDREN

The Child needs encouragement as a plant needs sunshine and water.

Encouragement involves the ability to accept children as worthwhile, regardless of any deficiency, and to assist them in developing their capacities and potentialities. No matter what a child's failing, you can bring about improvement through encouragement. Specifically, the person who encourages:

1. Places value on the child as he or she is.
2. Shows faith in the child and enables him or her to have faith in himself or herself.
3. Gives recognition for effort as well as recognizing a job well done.
4. Assists in the development of skills sequentially so as to assure success.
5. Recognizes and focuses on strengths and assets.
6. Helps the child develop the courage to be imperfect...to take mistakes in stride and learn from them.
7. Gives opportunities to be responsible to all members of the family group.
8. Shows the connection between a person's behavior and cooperative social living.

Recognizing Effort

- It's hard to start a new task, but once you've done it a few times it will seem easier.
- You have really improved in math.
- I know you can do it.
- Keep trying. Don't give up.
- You seem to have learned from your mistakes.

Encouraging Self-Reliance

- You cleaned your room by yourself! Doesn't it look nice.
- You got dressed all by yourself this morning. That's really grown up.

Encouraging Avoidance of Aggression

- That was very polite to give Larry some blocks when he tried to take yours away.
- Thank you for telling me how you felt. I did not realize I had spoken so abruptly.
- I like the way you explained to Leonard that he must wait until you are finished with the scooter.

Appreciating Helpfulness and Responsibility

- It's a big help when you run errands for me.
- You worked hard on that book review. You are learning some important things.
- Your helpfulness makes getting dinner much easier.

Recognizing Thoughtfulness and Generosity

- It made Tommy feel better when you helped him fix his boat.
- You took turns with Kathy very well.
- It's nice to have your help putting the dishes away.

Encouraging Self-Expression and Sociability

- I like to hear about the things that happen at school. Thank you for telling me about them.
- That was a nice smile you gave Grandmother. It made her feel warm and loved.
- Bob would be interested in hearing about your experience this afternoon.

- How good you look in your blue shirt and matching shorts.
- How pretty your hair looks when you brush it.

Letting Them Know You Like Them

- Hi, Glad to see you back.
- It's nice to have dinner out with my son.

It is strongly recommended that if a passport is not available, at least two forms of identification with photograph should be carried.
