

IN MEMORIAM KURT ALFRED ADLER (1905-1997)

On May 28, 1997 -- sixty years to the day after the death of his father — Kurt Alfred Adler, who was seeing patients up until the week before, died at the age of 92. For a few weeks before that, without rancor or complaint, he admitted to feeling unusually, deeply tired.

Small wonder. His life was exemplary in the exercise of every faculty in

engagement with the moment, and in the delight of conjunctive and passionate movement toward the goal of human triumph over tyranny, self-absorption, and despair. 92 years of that has to be tiring.



In conversation with him one felt that no distraction possible could break the spell of his alert attention, his transparent eagerness to be fully there, unwilling to miss a thing. This made for an incomparable charm. Watching him in

conversation with a woman, and catching a glimpse of her glowing face, one could only guess at the extent of her pleasure in feeling that there had never been another like her before, nor would there ever be one after.

Jane and I surprised him by showing up at his 90th birthday celebration, two years ago. He embraced and kissed us both, with an unmeasured, unstudied affection "I am a little embarrassed to be 90 years old," he whispered.

He was no embarrassment to the rest of us. Only that he was, at last, so tired persuades us to give our final thanks, to bid him farewell, and to consign him to his rest Only that.

Kurt Adler was born in Vienna, Austria; received a Ph.D. in physics from the University of Vienna in 1936 and an M.D. from Long Island College of Medicine, New York, in 1941. He was medical director and lecturer at the Alfred Adler Institute of New York for 45 years and practiced at Lennox Hill Hospital. For 39 years he was president of the board of the Advanced Institute of Analytic Psychotherapy in Queens. A charter member of NASAP, he served on its governing body for 26 years, was president in 1962-63 and presented at many of the Society's conventions. He is survived by his wife, Tanya; a daughter, Margot; a sister, Alexandra and a grandson, Alexander.

-Delegate Column--

Adlerian Psychology and The World of Work

I am writing this invited column as a representative to the Delegate Assembly from the Business and Organization interest group. In this article I will address why I feel Adlerian Psychology is relevant in the work place.

In many ways we in NASAP are just one big "extended" family, complete with all our authority issues ("Don't call us neo-Freudians") and our sibling rivalries ("Who is the next 'Dr. D' anyway?").

Like many multi-generational families, we NASAP folks are continually challenged with finding the proper balance between an <u>appreciation</u> for our history, as well as a new rebellious hybrid <u>pragmatic</u> group who dares discuss the integration of Adler with Gestalt, rational emotive therapy, existentialism, etc. Turning specifically to the B& O interest group, at my first Delegate Assembly meeting in Chicago last November, I did my best to model true political group membership by engaging in the following behaviors:

Making sure I got re-elected. Our group had reached the magical 50 members threshold only to drop below that figure recently, hence endangering our existence as an appropriately sanctioned NASAP interest group, and more importantly, threatening_my continued delegate assembly involvement. At the November semi-annual meeting in Chicago, I quickly engaged all my group dynamics wisdom gained from 25 years of academic committee work, by utilizing what I call the "Mighty 7 Dysfunctional D's," namely to delay, deny, dominate, defer, deflect, discourage and/or drop the major issues presented. My veteran colleagues quickly reframed my dysfunctional behavior by employing the "7 Constructive C's" of effective group membership: compromise, caring, compliments, collaboration, consideration, conciseness and constructiveness.

Permit me to conclude with the following observations/recommendations:

- (1) Adlerian family systems theory is ideally suited to the workplace. We have a theory that works in the extended job family.
- (2) In Megatrends, John Naisbitt aptly observed that "trends like horses are easier to ride in the direction they are already going." So here are some trends:

- a. Human capital as a budgeted item. Movie producer Louis Mayer aptly observed that "The inventory goes home at night." Recently I met with representatives of Singapore Airlines to negotiate consulting possibilities. Their Singapore training facility was truly state of the art, modern beautiful, impressive. "Don't you have trouble selling the concept of training to top management," I asked. "Oh no, it's part of our mission statement," my host replied, proudly pointing to an engraved plaque on her wall, "our company has all our employees participate in training seminars and workshops." Surely that's one reason why they consistently rate at the top of international surveys of customer satisfaction.
- b. The shift from management to leadership. Consistent with movements involving women, civil rights, and children, so too workers seek a shift in power over people (manager) to shared power, commitment and vision (leadership). Don Dinkmeyer, Sr. once told me that Adlerian psychology applied to organizations in the 90's is comparable to what we proposed in the 60's to child and family counseling.
- c. Feminine Leadership. Adler predicted the women's movement when he described "Masculine Protest," the cultural loss of the value of the feminine contrast to the masculine. Yes, the feminine is rising in business and everywhere. I conclude with a favorite leadership metaphor, a.k.a. Rich Kopp's wonderful book on Metaphor Therapy: Gail Forsythe, Executive Director of organizational learning services at 3M, says, "who is the leader of a hockey team? It switches back and forth depending on who has the puck. And the coach sitting on the sidelines without skates on! My role as a coach is about three things. Number one is to give the employees the tools they need to do their jobs... Number two is to remove obstacles that hinder team performance; nothing clogs a team's arteries faster than bureaucracy. Number three is to challenge the imagination... The sum of all actions of the coach is to give the team ownership and trust."

So remember... 1). Adlerian theory is ideally suited to business. 2). Join B&O and help me stay in office. (There is no pay but the fellowship is great!) 3). And finally, consider this, there are three kinds of leaders in the world — those who can add and those who cannot.

President's Message (Continued from page one)

The Delegate Assembly (DA), at its biannual meeting prior to the convention, spent most of the time discussing the proposed changes to the constitution (see previous newsletter), as suggested by the Long Range Planning Committee (LRPC). The DA did vote to recommend some major changes to the constitution, which means that the next step is to send out these recommended changes to the membership for a vote. You will be receiving this document, with accompanying rationale, in the summer. Those of you who attended the convention had a chance to discuss these proposed changes at your Region and Section meetings; if you were not at the convention, I urge you to discuss these proposed changes with your delegate(s), LRPC members, and other NASAP colleagues so you can make an informed decision when it is time to vote (changes to the constitution require a two-thirds vote of the General Members voting).

The constitution defines the organization in broad terms, the by-laws discuss more of the specific guidelines. The DA will be discussing bylaw changes at their meeting in November, and you will have a chance to influence those changes in at least two ways: talk to your delegates as I mentioned above, and note your comments on the space that will be provided on the form to vote for the constitution changes. I know this can seem complicated and confusing, please call a delegate or a member of the LRPC and we'll be happy to "walk you through it."

There are some other major changes anticipated in the organization. As you know, we are currently in the process of a search for a new executive director as Neva prepares for her retirement. We were also recently informed that Gerald J. Mozdzierz, the journal editor for Theory & Reseach issues, will not be renewing his term. We have initiated a search for a new journal editor (see article, page six). Other specific action items from the DA will be discussed in the next newsletter.

Summer has finally arrived in the upper midwest, after winter continued right through the anticipated spring. I'm looking forward to some relaxation and time with my family and friends, and wish you the same. Take care.


