Ansbacher Lecture To Highlight Adler's Pioneering Ideas

The Heinz L. and Rowena R. Ansbacher Lecture opening the 1998 NĀSAP Convention in Dallas, Texas, May 21, will "highlight Alfred Adler's pioneering ideas which have contributed to the development of other theoretical orientations underlying the practice of counseling and therapy," Gerald Corey told the Newsletter. Corey, the second Ansbacher lecturer, speaks with authority on the subject as a respected author of 46 books and texts in psychology and as a worldwide lecturer.

According to Corey, he will focus his talk on those concepts that he believes are most important in the practice of group counseling. The address will emphasize a personal perspective on the Adlerian approach to group counseling. Corey is regarded as one of the leading authors of texts in the U.S. with many of his books in fourth and fifth editions. (See page three for book of the month offers.)

Commenting on Adler's contribution to the field of psychology, Corey said, "It is difficult to overestimate the contributions of Adler to contemporary therapeutic practice. Adler's influence is certainly found in the development of many other theories and theorists, especially in the cognitive-behavioral movement. In several important respects, Adler seems to have paved the way for the current developments in the cognitive therapies. Adlerians' basic premise is that if one can change clients' thinking, one can change their feelings and behavior."

Two Corey Text Books Available From NASAP

This month's book offer features two best-selling texts by Gerald Corey — Theory and Practice of Counseling and Psychotherapy and Theory and Practice of Group Counseling. Published by Brooks/Cole Publishing Company, both books are hardback and offered to NASAP members through March 31 at a ten percent discount, \$49.95 and 44.95, respectively.

Theory and Practice of Counseling and Psychotherapy relates to the reader as a person. It speaks to the personal issues of the prospective counselor, presenting each counseling theory from the framework of the person who created it. The book rises to the challenge of teaching so many diverse theories of counseling by presenting only those theories which are both mainstream and current and by using the same format for each theory presented. The book covers nine contemporary theories and then demonstrates how each theory can be applied to a single case.

In *Theory and Practice of Group Counseling*, Corey outlines the basic elements of group process, deals with ethical and professional issues specific to group work, and presents an overview of the key concepts and techniques of 10 theoretical approaches to group counseling. The focus is on the practical applications of theoretical models to group work. Two of the chapters walk the reader through the various stages of group development. Corey integrates multicultural concerns in every chapter, covering ethical issues and the skills needed to become an effective multicultural group leader.

"A number of theorists in the cognitivebehavioral camp have acknowledged their debt to Adler. Some of these people include: Albert Ellis, the father of Rational Emotive Behavior Therapy, and the grandfather of cognitivebehavior therapy; Arnold Lazarus, a pioneer in clinical behavior therapy and also the founder of Multimodal Therapy; and William Glasser, the founder of Reality Therapy, or more currently called Choice Theory.

"Many of Adler's ideas have been incorporated in the writing and theories of Rollo May, Viktor Frankl, and Abraham Maslow. Both Frankl and May consider Adler as a forerunner of the existential movement because of his position that human beings are free to choose and are entirely responsible for what they make of themselves. This view makes him also a forerunner of the subjective approach to psychology, which focuses on the internal determinants of behavior: values, beliefs, attitudes, goals, interests, personal meanings, perceptions of reality, and striving toward selfactualization."

Gerald Corey, a psychologist licensed in California, is a professor of human services at California State University at Fullerton. He was first introduced to Adler as an undergraduate but began a more thorough study of his theory 25 years ago when he decided to add the Adlerian approach in his book, Theory and Practice of Counseling and Psychotherapy.

"There are a number of Adlerian concepts that I particularly value and incorporate into my work in facilitating group counseling, some of "which include: the subjective perception of reality, behavior as purposeful and goal-oriented, creativity and choice, striving for significance and superiority, role of family, lifestyle, social interest, reorientation, role of cognitive factors, insight and action, and therapy as education."

--News From Members--

Jean Burkholder was honored in November by 250 parents, teachers and administrators for her 22 years of service as an Urbana, Illinois school board member, according to the News Gazette, a local newspaper. The honor included the renaming of the district's administrative center as the Jean F. Burkholder Administrative Service Center. A longtime Adlerian, Jean commented during the event, "I remain convinced that all children can learn, and all children are brighter than we think they are."

Speakers at the reception noted that she was a good listener who was open and non-judgmental and that she was largely responsible for creating the openness, teamwork, cooperation and mutual respect of the district.

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Manford Sonstegard is the subject of a documentary being created by Carol Mitchell. Filming includes Sonstegard teaching a lifestyle assessment class at Kent State University which met with such enthusiasm that the students formed a new Adlerian Society in Ohio. "The documentary will also include some archival footage, photographs and articles from Dr. Sonstegard's early days," Carol said.

It was also reported that Sonstegard is now residing in England. His new address is April Cottage, 37 Risborough Rd, Stoke Mandeville, Aylesbury, Bucks HP 225UP, England. Continuing his work in his new home, he was invited to speak at Oslo International School Parent's Association. The event was attended by 26 enthusiatic parents from several countries.

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In Memoriam

Lucy Ackerknecht died in November, a few weeks after suffering a stroke, her family informed us. She had been a member of NASAP since 1959 and was designated a life member several years ago in honor of her long service to the Adlerian community.

Dr. Ackerknecht was an educator who formed her own school in Oakland, California, Adlerian Western Institute for Research and Training in Humanics, (AWIRTH). In addition to teaching a variety of Adlerian courses to U.S. students, AWIRTH also offered a European Summer School which provided classes in Southern France and Eischen, Luxembourg in the native languages.

Ina Block Receives Recognition for Service

Last month the Alfred Adler Institute of New York held a testimonial brunch to honor Ina Block for her 43 years of dedicated and outstanding service to the Institute as Director of Admissions and Dean of Students, reports Ellen Mendell. Over 75 people, comprising faculty, board members, alumni, students, colleagues and friends, attended the event. Many provided tributes to Ina with each speaker tapping into her various abilities and characteristics.

Ina Block came to AAINY as a student and became its registrar, then rose through the ranks to her current positions. Through the years she worked closely with many Executve Directors (from Helena Papanek, Kurt Adler and onward) plus many boards of trustees, faculty members and students. Many of the tributes highlighted her impact on students, her generous giving of time and ideas, and her unwavering commitment to excellence.

Ina Block is one of the few remaining Adlerians who had personal contact with Alfred Adler. As a young student in Vienna, she remembers listening to his lectures and seeing him sitting in the Cafe Ziller at his favorite round table. She has been a member of NĀSAP since 1967 and served on the Delegate Assembly from 1975-78.

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Kathy and Frank Walton recently returned from their second teaching experience in Romania and Slovakia after being brought back by popular demand. "Teachers and parents we had met in March were excited about the progress they had made implementing Adlerian principles and techniques in Romania," Frank told the Newsletter. Two Adlerian societies had been formed in Transylvania and one of Frank's lectures was videotaped for presentation at the Hungarian Adlerian Society conference next April. In Bratislava, Slovakia, faculty members at Comenius University reported that student evaluations ranked Kathy and Frank's lectures and demonstrations as the most valuable learning experience of the semester. "It is ironic that we are helping to introduce Adlerian psychology in Bratislava," Frank said, since that is "relatively down the street from its birthplace in Vienna."

Meanwhile, back at home, Frank is scheduled to present a full-day workshop, *Counseling and Parenting of Teenagers*, April 2 for the Michigan Association of Children's Alliances in Lansing.
